THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1950

Proceedings at the Annual General Meeting, 1950

THE FIFTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Association being the fourteenth Annual Meeting since the opening of the Museum, was held on Thursday, March 9th, 1950, in the Small Room of the Guildhall.

The Patron-President, Lord Fairhaven, was in the Chair supported by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. J. K. Taylor, and the

Acting Hon. Secretary, Mr. E. Saville Peck.

The Report of the Annual General Meeting held on March

9th, 1949, was approved and signed by the Chairman.

The Annual Report for the year ending December 31st, 1949, was received and adopted. The audited statement of accounts was presented by the Hon. Treasurer and adopted on the proposal of Ald. F. J. Priest, seconded by Mr. E. B. Haddon. Mr. Chater Blows was appointed Auditor at the remuneration of five guineas.

Lord Fairhaven, on the proposition of Mr. Fyjis-Walker, was unanimously re-elected as Patron-President, The Vice-Presidents were re-elected, as were also the Hon. Treasurer,

the Acting Hon. Secretary and the Hon. Curator.

The President then reported on the receipt of the appointment to the Council of Management of the persons nominated by the representative bodies mentioned in Article 49 of the Articles of Association, including the nine representatives of the Borough Council. Special Resolutions for certain modifications of the Articles of Association were moved by Mr. Fyjis-Walker, seconded by Professor Sir Ellis Minns and carried unanimously.

At the conclusion of the meeting an interesting talk on "Treen or Wooden Bygones" was given by Mr. Edward H. Pinto, assisted by Mrs. Pinto and illustrated by pictures and specimens of woodware. Mr. and Mrs. Pinto were warmly thanked by the President. Thanks were also accorded to Dr. G. H. S. Bushnell for providing and working the epidia-

scope during the lecture.

At a meeting of the Council on April 19th, 1950, Mr. E. S. Peck, who had been Acting Hon. Secretary, was elected President, and Ald. F. J. Priest was elected to fill the vacancy as Hon. Secretary.

The Hon. Treasurer, Mr. J. K. Taylor, at a meeting of the Executive Committee held on December 20th, 1950,

tendered his resignation owing to pressure of business. This tendered his resignation, and thanks were accorded to him

Further efforts were made during 1950 to effect a transfer of the Museum from Castle Street to Abbey House. Professor of the Museum Hon. Consulting Architect, estimated Richardson, R.A., the Hon. Consulting Architect, estimated Richardson, R. L., ooo would cover the cost of necessary alteratons, re-decorations, etc., to adapt the Abbey House to the needs of a Museum. It was proposed that this sum be raised by appeal, and that, when the money was obtained, the Borough Council be asked to take over the Folk Msueum when it was established at the Abbey House and assume full responsibility for its upkeep and maintenance. Accordingly in July 1950 a preliminary full report on the Folk Museum and the Abbey House was submitted to the General Purposes Committee of the Borough Council. The Committee, while sympathetic and appreciative of the work of the Museum, were however, unable to recommend the taking over of the Museum at the present time, the estimated annual cost of maintaining it at the Abbey House being over £2,000. A further difficulty was the inability of the Housing Committee to release the accommodation at present occupied by three families for whom no alternative premises were available. This decision was received with deep regret by the Council of Management. They agreed that steps be taken to covenant the Abbey House with the National Trust.

On July 13th, 1950, some of the members of the Council of Management visited Shepreth where the Vicar, Rev. C. J. Sharp, conducted them round his museum. The visit was an enjoyable one and warm thanks were accorded Mr. Sharp.

ABBEY HOUSE

Changes in tenancies during 1950 have taken place at Nos. 1 and 2 Abbey House. Arrangements have been made for the exterior painting of the house in the spring of 1951, for re-decorating and repairs to the inside of No. 1 and for the repair of the fence on the Beche and Abbey Roads frontage.

RESIDENT CURATOR'S REPORT

There has again been a slight increase in the number of visitors to the Museum during 1950, with a total of 3,551. Of these 1,561 attended on free days, this number including 591 school child school children in organized groups. School visits, which are High School I Bestwood Modern School, London; Priory School, Acton; and Prestwood Modern School, Wolverhampton.

Four special Exhibitions were held during the year; Hats and Bonnets, 1760-1920; Photographs of the Borough

Charters (by kind permission of the Borough Council); Boating in Cambridge and Treen or Small Woodware. An analysis of visitors to these exhibitions shows that those dealing with the history of Cambridge are the most popular. For this reason a comprehensive display of exhibits dealing with the life and work of the town is being arranged for 1951 to attract the visitors expected for the Festival and the Royal

More exhibitions have been loaned to the Perse Boys' School. These lead to visits to the Museum of both boys and

their parents.

One side of the Museum's work is increasing. This is the part played by the Museum as a bureau of information, many enquiries coming weekly from all parts of the country and from abroad. A typical day's batch of enquiries covered such topics as the dress of 16th century woodmen, the date and cost of erecting the town goal, pewter touch marks and the formation of bog oak.

During 1950 the Resident Curator gave 45 talks to Youth Club's, Women's Institutes, Social Clubs and other organ-

izations.

Some interior decoration has been carried out at the Museum, while the addition of wooden battens to the walls of the Trades and Occupations Room enables exhibits to be


displayed to greater advantage.

The carrier's wagon which formerly stood exposed in the yard has been removed to a barn at the Manor House, Melbourn, by kind permission of Mr. K. W. Welfare. The Cambridge Antiquarian Society has also kindly allowed certain of the vehicles, only partly under cover at the White Horse to be stored in the Cellarer's Checker in Beche Road. The vehicles will remain under the Museum's supervision, and although not on view to the public except by special application, will be more adequately protected from the weather than heretofore. When it is possible to move the Museum to Abbey House permanent and weatherproof accommodation will be found for them there.


REPORT OF THE HON. TREASURER
