THE SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1951

Proceedings at the Annual General Meeting, 1951

THE SIXTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Association being the fifteenth since the opening of the Museum, was held on Thursday, 15th March, 1951, in the Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology.

The Patron, Lord Fairhaven, was in the Chair, supported by the Hon. Treasurer, Mr. J. K. Taylor, J.P., and the Hon. Secretary, Alderman F. J. Priest, and about 60 members.

The Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on 9th March, 1950, were approved and signed by the Chairman.

The Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1950, was received and adopted. The audited statement of accounts was presented by the Hon. Treasurer and adopted. Mr. Chater Blows was re-appointed Auditor at a remuneration of five guineas.

The Patron, the President, the Vice-Presidents and the Hon. Secretary were unanimously re-elected. There being no nomination for the office of Hon. Treasurer in place of Mr. J. K. Taylor who had resigned, it was left to the Executive Committee to make an appointment.

Three vacancies on the Council of Management were filled by the appointment of Sir Henry McAnally, Mr. T. N. Gallyon and Mr. R. Heffer. Mr. B. G. W. Cash of Bottisham Village College was nominated to represent the Cambridgeshire Branch of the National Union of Teachers.

At the conclusion of the meeting a most entertaining lecture on "Old Church Musical Instruments," with practical demonstrations, was given by the Reverend Noel Boston, M.A., F.S.A., Vicar of East Dereham, for which he was warmly thanked by Mr. E. A. B. Barnard.

The outstanding event of the past year was the visit of T.R.H. the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester to the Museum on Wednesday, 1st August, when, in the unavoidable absence of the Patron, the President, Mr. E. Saville Peck, received the royal visitors. The visit lasted for nearly an hour and Their Royal Highnesses showed considerable interest in many of the exhibits as they were being conducted round by the Resident Curator.

A reception and tea given by the President and Mrs. Peck at the Museum on May 23rd, was greatly enjoyed by upwards of 60 guests.

ABBEY HOUSE

During the year the exterior of the Abbey House has been repainted and some interior decoration to an attic carried out. The fence in Beche Road has been repaired and further depredations to the old wall prevented.

Steps are being taken to covenant the property with the

National Trust.

RESIDENT CURATOR'S REPORT

Once again a slight increase in attendance can be reported, the total number of visitors to the Museum during 1951 being 3,700. It is encouraging to see that the number of school visits has risen to the record figure of 754.

Curators of several other Museums have visited us during the year, including the Director of the Children's Museum in Brooklyn, New York, who was on a tour of English museums which offer special educational services.

Training College students in the City continue to make full and frequent use of the Museum. For this reason it is important that a collection of books, dealing with the subjects covered by the Museum, should be built up so that students can consult them during their visits. In the past some books were kindly presented by friends of the Museum, and these, with the Resident Curator's own collection, are much in demand. Further additions to our library would, however, be greatly appreciated.

Visitors to the Museum have on many occasions asked whether a Guide or Catalogue were obtainable. As some of the exhibits are changed from time to time to allow as many as possible to be shown in turn in our now very restricted space, a detailed catalogue was not possible. A brief Guide has, however, been published and is now on sale. Two of the photographs from the book are reproduced in this report.

Three more special exhibitions were held during the year: "Local Maps and Plans"; "Cambridge at Work—a Survey of some Typical Industries of the City and County" and "Fashion Plates, 1751-1951." The last named exhibition was attended on the opening day by the Mayoress, Mrs. H. O. Langdon. In the preparation of the Festival exhibition of Cambridge at Work the Resident Curator was greatly indebted to the various local firms who assisted her by lending and, in some cases, by giving suitable material for such an exhibition.

Exhibits have again been loaned to local schools and Village Colleges, while a series of exhibitions have been arranged at the Perse School for Boys throughout the year.

During 1951 the Resident Curator gave over 50 talks in Cambridge and surrounding villages and a full programme is already arranged for 1952.

We are, as always, most grateful to the Editor and Staff of the Cambridge Daily News who are always ready to print items of news concerning the Museum and whose reporters are unfailingly the first visitors to any exhibition or function held at the Museum.

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT.

In the Revenue Report of the Folk Museum I have to point to the deficit on the year of £34 10s. 2d.

Grants received from the City Corporation amounted to £350 and in July it was decided by the City Council to meet whatever deficit there should be on a year's working, up to the amount of £500; in other words, to meet any deficit in any year, provided it is also supported by voluntary effort.

All must be grateful for this both necessary and generous subsidy. It is at the same time a recognition of the loyalty and liberal-mindedness of those who over the years have subscribed to and supported the work of the Museum. May they continue to do so and their numbers increase.
