THE TWENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 1955

Proceedings at the Annual General Meeting, 1955

THE TENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Association, being the nineteenth since the opening of the Museum, was held on Thursday, 24th March, 1955, at 2.45 p.m. in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, Cambridge, by kind permission of the Right Worshipful the Mayor, Councillor H. R. Mallett, M.A., J.P.

In the absence of the Patron, Lord Fairhaven, the Hon. Secretary invited Councillor Burkitt, a Vice-President, to take the Chair. He was supported by the Hon. Secretary, Alderman F. J. Priest, the Resident Curator, Miss E. M. Porter, and about 40 members.

The Hon. Secretary read the notice convening the meeting and the Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting were read, confirmed and signed.

Apologies for non-attendance were read from Lord Fair-haven, Canon R. Corboy, Mr. T. N. Gallyon, Mr. H. I. Fyjis-Walker, Miss Giles and Mrs. Mayne.

The Hon Secretary referred to the great loss sustained by the Museum in the death, on January 16th, 1955, of Mr. E. Saville Peck, founder and first President. He read an extract from a letter from Lord Fairhaven in which the latter expressed his wish to be associated with the tribute which he knew would be paid at the meeting to the memory of Mr. Peck. At the invitation of the Chairman members stood for a minute as token of their respect. The Hon. Secretary was instructed to send to Mrs. Peck a letter of condolence on behalf of the Museum

In the unavoidable absence of the Hon. Treasurer, his report was read by the Hon. Secretary. In this report Canon Corboy stated that the deficit in the accounts for 1954 was £322 1s. 7d., which had been met by a grant from the City Corporation of therefore, the balance of £77 18s. 5d. had been repaid to the entrance fees had risen slightly during the year but expenditure

on repairs, redecoration and renewals at Castle Street had been less than in 1953, owing to the possibility of moving. More would, therefore, have to be spent on these items in 1955. He expressed his gratitude to the City Corporation for their grant which ensured the continuance of the Museum, and to the subscribers who continued so faithfully to support the Museum's work. The financial accounts were then unanimously adopted by the meeting.

In presenting the Annual Report for the year ending 31st December, 1954, the Hon. Secretary referred to the question of moving the Museum. The Council of Management had, with great regret, been obliged to cancel the move for the time being owing to the high maintenance costs which would have to be met at Abbey House with decreased income owing to loss of rents. Meanwhile the three portions of the house had been re-let on a more satisfactory tenure of five years and the Museum would continue at Castle Street. He spoke of the changes shortly to be made in the Museum yard, necessary because of the widening of Northampton Street. This would mean the loss of the shed at the end of the yard, and the removal of the shop front and the figures from the Conduit Head to positions nearer the entrance gate.

The Annual Report was then unanimously adopted by the meeting.

Appointment of Auditor.

Mr. R. Chater Blows was re-elected Auditor.

Election of Executive Committee.

Lord Fairhaven was unanimously recelected Patron, as were also the five Vice-Presidents, the Hon. Treasurer and the Hon. Curator. It was announced that the Rt. Hon. H. U. Willink, M.C., M.A., Master of Magdalene, had kindly consented to fill the office of President, vacant by the death of Mr. E. Saville Peck. As Lord Fairhaven had intimated that, owing to pressure of engagements, he might not be able to attend future Council of Management meetings, at which he had usually taken the Chair, it was suggested that Alderman F. J. Priest would act as Chairman of the meetings of the Executive Committee and, when neither Patron nor President were present, at those of the Council of Management, while the secretarial duties would be undertaken by the Resident Curator, Miss Porter. This was agreed to.

The business concluded, there followed an entertaining lecture on "Archaeology and the Public" by Dr. Glyn Daniel of St. John's College, for which he was thanked by Councillor Burkitt seconded by Councillor Warren. The members then adjourned for tea at the kind invitation of Lord Fairhaven.

The Year in Retrospect.

Taking a practical view of the situation it was apparent that there was no hope of moving the Museum from Castle Street to Abbey House for some time to come. In these circumstances, to facilitate the letting of the two vacant parts of the house, all three tenants were given extended leases of up to five years.

The lime trees facing Abbey Road were trimmed and a sycamore tree whose roots were found to be damaging adjacent property, was removed. Application had been made by the tenant of No. 1, a local Health Visitor, for permission to erect a temporary garage in the front garden. The National Trust, with whom the property is covenanted, was consulted and it had left the matter to be decided by the Museum, subject to permission by the local planning authority. After an inspection of the site by a special sub-committee, they reported that they

could see no objection to the proposal.

Since her operation at the end of March, 1954, our Resident Curator, Miss Porter, has never been really well. Subsequent hospital treatment was found necessary and she was re-admitted to Addenbrooke's in July. A further complication, and one for which the Council of Management must take responsibility, was caused by a fall due to the breaking away of the wooden facings of the cellar steps while Miss Porter was on a routine visit to the central heating boiler of the Museum. A recent examination by a London specialist indicates some further hospital treatment and it is the wish of everyone that after this Miss Porter can look forward to carrying on her duties without the present handicap of pain and discomfort.

HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

I beg leave to present the Statement of Accounts which may be read on pages 14 and 15. In an interim report to the Council of Management in October, I expressed an opinion that we should just pay our way on the year with very little to spare. We had already drawn £400 of the City Corporation grant and were about to draw the final £100. Actually that forecast was faulty. On December 31st, 1955, theree was a deficit of £36 12s. 10d. The Appropriation Account sets out the position of our affairs with reference to the City grant, the terms of which are that it will meet our gross deficit up to £500. The gross deficit last year was £536 12s. 10d.

The Income and Expenditure Account shows the greatest increase of expenditure to have been on repairs, redecoration and maintenance; this was £172 18s. 0d. as against £40 8s. 11d. in 1954. The greater part of this—£109 18s. 6d.—was spent on Abbey House. On the Income side, rents were less by £32 18s. 0d. owing to one of the flats being vacant for a period. On this same side I should draw attention to the donation from the Cambridgeshire Folk Lore Society. This Society was dis-

solved in October last and at its final meeting it was resolved to hand over its remaining funds to the Folk Museum Association. I received, therefore, the sum of £16 14s. 9d. from Mr. J. Saltmarsh, the last Hon. Treasurer of the Society, who wrote: "No conditions are attached to the gift, but a wish was expressed at the Society's final meeting that if at any time a society with similar objects should be established in Cambridge, the Association would look favourably upon it and give it such assistance as might be in its power." In my reply, after expressing our thanks, I wrote what I am sure you will endorse: "To do what I can to ensure that favourable regard which you request of the Folk Museum towards a subsequent re-birth of a Folk Lore Society, I shall preserve your letter in the Museum files, even though a kinship of interest should itself evoke such regard."

Finally, I should like to express our sincere thanks to the Education Committees of City and County, to the Colleges, to Lord Fairhaven, to subscribing business firms, to the Women's Institutes and to other friends of the Museum for the courtesy and generosity of their support, and to the City Corporation on which the Museum fundamentally depends. My last word of thanks is for the small but welcome anonymous donations from visitors to the Museum. A ltitle gift can be a precious one.

RESIDENT CURATOR'S REPORT

For the first time in six years there has been a slight decrease in the number of visitors to the Museum, the drop in attendance coinciding with the very cold weather in February and with the first really hot summer for some time, which probably encouraged people to keep out of doors. Group visits to the Museum included the National Council of Women, Post Office Trainees, Townswomen's Guilds, Schools and Youth Clubs. The Museum was opened in the evenings for the benefit of those clubs unable to attend during the day.

Three Exhibitions were held during the year: "Postcard Views of Old Cambridge," "Cambridge in Print" and "Some Acquisitions of 1955." These and other Museum activities were reported in the "Cambridge Daily News" to whose editor, photographer and staff I wish to extend my thanks for their continued cooperation and interest. I gave a number of talks to various societies and clubs, the British Council vacation course and to schools in Cambridge and near-by villages, Bedfordshire and as far afield as Brighton.

In June a new and revised edition of my Brief Guide to the Museum, with an additional photograph, was published. Authorisation has been granted by the Council of Management for a series of three or four postcard photographs of some of the exhibits in the Museum to be produced for sale. It is hoped that these will be ready early in the coming year. solved in October last and at its final meeting it was resolved to hand over its remaining funds to the Folk Museum Association. 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The widening of Northampton Street in the summer necessitated certain changes in the Museum yard. The brick wall has been replaced by an oak fence set several feet further in, the shop front and the four pillars from the Conduit Head formerly in the Market Place have been moved nearer to the entrance gates, and the large stables at the end of the yard, which was a valuable storage place, has been pulled down. Surveyor's Department of the City Corporation assisted in every way to overcome the difficulties arising from the demolition of the stable and, by affixing certain of the larger exhibits to the wall of the lean-to stable at the side of the yard, it has been found possible to place some of the hitherto stored objects on Through the courtesy of the Commons Department hydrangeas and golden box have now been planted against the new fence.

Outstanding among the acquisitions of 1955, noted at the end of this Report, were collections of nearly 600 different postcard photographs of Cambridge, c. 1906-1912, and of local newspaper cuttings covering the period 1915-1950, both given by Miss L. Clarke. The photographs include those of colleges, streets, the commons and river, the opening of the Downing Street Museums by King Edward VII and other local events.

The alterations to be made in St. Andrew's Street and Emmanuel Street have caused the demolition of No. 58, St. Andrew's Street, for many years the residence of various physicians and surgeons. The house, contemporary with the Emmanuel Street cottages, but altered in the 18th century, contained a panelled drawing room with fine plasterwork ceiling, a good staircase and another room in which the original Elizabethan panelling was uncovered during demolition. Three photographs of these interiors were taken at my request by Messrs. Stearn for inclusion in our photographic records.

Other acquisitions of special interest include six glass salt rollers, a collection of 50 Valentines, some photographs which I "rescued" from Miss Payne's shop in Emmanuel Street the day before it was demolished, and a 1677 trade token struck by John Dodd. The Association is deeply grateful to all those donors who add to the Museum's collection. Gifts of photographs, books of Cambridge and general Museum interest, maps, plans and old Directories are particularly appreciated.
