## THE TWENTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD 1ST JANUARY, 1964 TO 31ST MARCH, 1965
Proceedings of the Annual General Meeting, 1964

THE NINETEENTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Association since its Incorporation, being the twenty-eighth since the opening of the Museum, was held on Wednesday, 11th March, 1964, at 2.30 p.m. in Committee Room No. 1 of the Guildhall.

The President, Sir Henry Willink, Q.C., M.C., Master of Magdalene, was in the Chair.

Apologies were received from Dr. G. H. S. Bushnell, Mr. T. N. Gallyon, Dr. W. Balfour Gourlay, Councillor B. M. Keane and Mr. D. J. Muggleton.

The Chairman moved the adoption of the Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting held on 19th March, 1963, these being printed in the Annual Report which had been circulated to members. The proposal was agreed to and the Minutes were duly signed.

Presenting the audited statement of accounts the Hon. Treasurer, Alderman F. J. Priest, said that the period between January 1st and March 31st each year had always been a difficult one for the Museum because its financial year ended on December 31st and that of the City Corporation on March 31st. Hitherto any part of the City Grant not spent by December 31st was expected to be returned, which left the Museum with very few resources to meet the expenses of the first three months of the following year. He was pleased to report, however, that the City Treasurer had been persuaded of this difficulty and the matter was now agreed upon.

The General Purposes Committee of the City Council had, he said, approved a grant of £1,000 for the year 1st April, 1964, to 31st March 1965, subject to confirmation by the City Council at their next meeting. Of this grant, however, £633 would have to be paid back to the Corporation in rent and rates.

The Hon. Treasurer referred to the expense of printing the Annual Report in its present form, the cost being 5/- per copy. It was agreed that it be left to the Executive Committee to investigate other methods of producing the Report.

On the proposal of Councillor E. H. Cherry, seconded by Lord Fairhaven, the accounts were adopted.

The Chairman then presented the Annual Report. He referred to the list of interesting accessions received at the Museum during 1963 and thanked the Curator for all her work. In the matter of the exterior restoration of Abbey House the work was, he said, now well in hand and he thought that the whole appearance of the property would be greatly improved.

On the proposal of Councillor M. C. Burkitt, seconded by Alderman W. T. Hardesty, the Report was adopted.

#### Appointment of Auditor

The remuneration of the auditor, Mr. R. C. Blows, was approved at £7 7s. 0d. for his work on the 1963 accounts. The Hon. Treasurer then proposed that, as Mr. Blows had now moved his office farther away to Bateman Street, the accounts in future be audited by Messrs. Chater & Myhill who, being in Jesus Lane, were more accessible. He had approached this firm and they had agreed to take on the work at a fee of £7 7s. 0d. Mr. F. R. Salter seconded the proposal which was carried unanimously.

#### Election of Officers

The Chairman extended to Lord Fairhaven the invitation of the Association to continue as its Patron. Lord Fairhaven said that he would be very pleased to continue to serve.

Councillor M. C. Burkitt, seconded by Mr. J. Saltmarsh, moved that the Master of Magdalene, Sir Henry Willink, Q.C., M.C., be re-elected as President. This was carried unanimously.

The Chairman then moved the re-election of Alderman F. J. Priest, M.B.E., as Hon. Treasurer and of the five Vice-Presidents. The meeting carried this proposal.

Business being concluded, the Curator, Miss E. M. Porter, B.A., gave a short talk on "Shopping in Old Cambridge" which she illustrated with a number of local tradesmen's bills of the 19th century, part of a collection received at the Museum during 1963. At the conclusion of her talk she was warmly thanked by the Chairman.

## ANNUAL REPORT: MARCH 1965

Details of the exterior work of restoration of the Abbey House appeared in the last Annual Report of 1963. This work has now been completed and the appearance of the house has been greatly improved.

There has been a change of tenancy as from Michaelmas 1964. The property is divided into three hereditaments, Nos. 1, 2 and 3. The tenants of Nos 1 and 2 have left and that part of the house has been leased to Professor Danckwerts, G.C., M.A., of Pembroke College, who is carrying out extensive alterations and repairs, plans of which have been submitted to and approved by the City Planning Committee, the Folk Museum authorities and the National Trust.

In the course of these alterations there arose the need for some repairs for which the Folk Museum, as landlords, are responsible. Professor Danckwerts, has, however, agreed to have these items, amounting to about £250, added to his account with the builders, Messrs. Coulson & Son, and an adjustment in the rent payable by him is being allowed for in the lease being drawn up.

The tenancy of No. 3 is unchanged and the tenant, Mr. C. S. Wisbey, has carried out some internal improvements at his own expense, in return for which there is an understanding that he shall retain the tenancy for as long as he wishes after which it will be offered to Professor Danckwerts.

## HON. TREASURER'S REPORT

The incongruous position created by the Folk Museum's financial year ending on December 31st and that of the City on March 31st has now been rectified. From April 1st 1965, our financial years will run co-terminously with the City's and thereby solve a number of financial difficulties. The Museum balance sheet, therefore, presented with this Report, is for a period of fifteen months instead of twelve months as heretofore. This was inevitable in view of the change-over. In 1966 the financial statement will revert to twelve months and will cover from April 1st, 1965, to March 31st, 1966.

In the circumstances it will be realised that the financial situation of the Museum's affairs will tend to be somewhat out of focus. This aspect is accentuated by the fact that we borrowed £2,000 from the City Corporation at 6½% per annum to finance the exterior work being carried out at Abbey House. This loan is being paid back over a term of years at the rate of £208 10s. 0d. per annum.

The Corporation's annual grant remains at £1,000, but when it is realised that the rent (£500), rates (£157) and repayment of loan (£208) will amount to £865, it will be seen that only a very small balance of £135 will remain for general expenses. As I stated in the last Annual Report, our peculiar relationship with the

City Corporation may make it imperative, if we are to meet our obligations to them to the extent of £865 per annum, for them to come to our aid if cheques drawn in their favour are to be honoured by the bank.

In October I approached the Clerk to the new Cambridgeshire and Isle of Ely County Council with a view to obtaining an increased grant from the new authority. The annual County Council grant has been £100, but I am hoping that when the Folk Museum grant comes up for review my request for £500 per annum from the new authority will be favourably considered.

The County Education Authority and the City Committee for Education continue to recognise the educational value of the Folk Museum by making separate Grants which are most valuable. I also acknowledge with grateful thanks donations from the Chesterton Rural District Council, the South Cambridgeshire Rural District Council, many Colleges and other public bodies as well as individual subscribers who, by bankers' orders and individual payments, help us along a rather thorny financial path.

## CURATOR'S REPORT

6,824 visitors came to the Museum during the fifteen months between 1st January 1964 and 31st March 1965; attendance from January to December 1964 was the second highest on record while the number of school children (1,510) mainly from City and County schools, was an all-time record. Several clubs and societies paid evening visits and the Curator accepted an unusually large number of invitations to give talks in Cambridge, Cambridgeshire and elsewhere.

Three special Exhibitions have been held: "Cambridge Playbills," "In City and County" and "Posters and Programmes."

The list of the principal accessions received since January 1964 is printed on pages 13 to 17 of this Report. The Council of Management is especially grateful to Lord Fairhaven for making it possible for the Curator to purchase a number of items of local interest at the Auction Sale of the contents of Mr. Cross's Museum in Ely. These include agricultural implements, photographs and domestic equipment, among the latter an unusual type of knife cleaner and an 18th century iron Digester, fore-runner of the modern pressure cooker. Two very fine glazed earthenware casks, one for gin and one for brandy, were also purchased at the sale and make handsome additions to the exhibits in the Bar.

Mrs. Raynes very kindly made a further large donation of local tradesmen's bills, sale catalogues and posters of the 19th and early 20th centuries so that we now possess a very comprehensive collection of such items.

A fine model of a combined passenger and cargo ocean-going steamer made by the late Mr. Albert Smith of Cambridge was presented by his daughter. This was exhibited at the first meeting in 1938 of the Cambridge Society of Model Engineers and was later awarded the Society's cup, also now in the Museum, offered for the best model boat in a competition organised on the occasion of the showing in Cambridge of the film "Captain Hornblower."

The Curator has long been on the look-out for an example of the metal cans, with hinged lids and brass handles, in which dairymen used to deliver milk to customers before the use of bottles. Two such cans from local dairies were given during the past year together with metal dippers, of varying capacities, for ladling the milk out of the churns.

An interesting folklore item received was a pair of mole's feet which, carried in the pocket, were considered in the Fens to be an infallible cure and preventive of rheumatism. The Folk-Lore Society has deposited on loan their collection of material formerly stored in the Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology in Cambridge.

Our collection of vermin traps has been increased by the addition of a hawk trap, purchased at the Ely sale, one for rats and a handmade one for moles.

Mr. B. J. Matthew, on the closure of his Trinity Street shop, gave a number of interesting items, among them an account book for groceries supplied between 1825 and 1902 by successive members of the Matthew family and by their predecessor to the Judges when in Cambridge.

An outstanding accession, presented by Mr. L. J. Chater, is the MS diary, contained in twenty thick quarto notebooks and covering the period 1842 to 1883, of his father Josiah Chater. Josiah Chater came to Cambridge from Saffron Walden to work in Mr. Eaden Lilley's counting house; later he founded, with his brother, his own woollen drapery business first in Sidney Street then at No. 1 Market Hill. Later still he became an accountant, members of his family still carrying on this profession in Cambridge, and it is a happy coincidence that the Museum's accounts are audited by his descendants. In addition to his other activities Josiah Chater was Secretary of the Cambridge Street Tramway Company and of

the Steam Laundry, while he played an important part in the founding of the local branch of the Y.M.C.A. A detailed account of the building of the Association's premises in Alexandra Street is contained in the diary which unfolds a fascinating panorama of Cambridge life in the last century. We are immensely grateful to Mr. Chater for placing such an invaluable gift in our keeping.

An ever-generous friend of the Museum, Mr. T. W. Bagshawe, presented, with two other books, a bound photo-print of the British Museum pamphlet of 1659 "A Lying Wonder Discovered and the Strange and Terrible News from Cambridge proved false..." This deals with an alleged case of witchcraft in Long-stanton and was written by a group of Cambridge Quakers to refute accusations made in a now-lost pamphlet of John Bunyan referring to the same case.

As in other years most of our new accessions have been gifts, but through the kindness of a local bookseller in drawing our attention to the sale of a small private library we were able to purchase several moderately-priced books and pamphlets of local interest. A few additions to our photographic records were also purchased, but among those received as gifts mention must be made of the photograph of the unusual Ely earthenware curfew or fire damper and that, given by the Marylebone Cricket Club, of an early 19th century portrait of a boy playing at Trap Ball, or Bat and Trap as this once popular game was called in Cambridgeshire.
