## THE THIRTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD 1ST APRIL, 1968 TO 31ST MARCH, 1969

Proceedings of the Annual General Meeting, 1968

THE TWENTY-THIRD ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Association since its Incorporation, being the thirty-second since the opening of the Museum, was held on Thursday, 3rd October, 1968, at 2.45 p.m. in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, Cambridge.

The President, Sir Henry Willink, Bt., M.C., Q.C., was in the Chair.

Before proceeding to the business of the meeting he instructed the Secretary to convey to the Chairman of the Property Committee of the City Council the Association's thanks for permission to hold the meeting in the Council Chamber.

The Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting held on 12th July, 1967 and those of the Extraordinary General Meeting held on 9th February, 1968, both of which were printed in the Annual Report already circulated to members, were then confirmed and signed by the Chairman.

The adoption of the audited Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet was moved from the Chair and carried unanimously.

The Chairman referred to the loss sustained by the Association through the death of Mr. F. R. Salter, who had for many years represented the Council of the Senate on the Museum Council of Management. A worthy successor, however, had been found in Dr. Glyn Daniel who had, at his first attendance at a meeting of the Council, suggested that application might be made to the Appeals Committee of Anglia Television Ltd. for a grant towards the purchase of objects for the Museum. The Chairman said that he was pleased to report that a generous grant of £100 had been received.

The Hon. Treasurer reported that the Museum had been registered as a Charity, the registration being back-dated to September, 1966. In future the payment of Selective Employment Tax would be unnecessary and a refund of part of that already paid had been received. He drew attention to the very small excess of income over expenditure and emphasised that this had only been made possible by careful economy.

The motion that the Report be adopted was moved by Councillor A. W. Arundale, seconded by Alderman P. J. Warren and carried unanimously.

### Appointment of Auditor

It was moved from the Chair that Messrs. Chater & Myhill be re-appointed auditors for the year ending 31st March, 1969 and that their fee for the year ended 31st March, 1968 should be 15 guineas. This was carried.

#### Resignation of Hon. Treasurer

The Chairman announced that Mr. J. B. Wright had announced at a meeting of the Council of Management, held on 26th June, 1968 that he felt he could not, as he lived in Huntingdon, devote sufficient time to the work of Museum Treasurer. He had declared himself willing, however, to continue in office until this meeting and had, meanwhile, found a successor in Mr. R. Robins who lived in Cambridge and who was a former bank colleague. Mr. Robins had said that, subject to the ratification of his appointment at this Annual General Meeting, he would be prepared to serve for a provisional period of one year. The Chairman reported that at the meeting of the Council of Management in July it had been proposed that, subject to the approval of the Annual General Meeting, an honorarium of 25 guineas should, in future, be paid to the Treasurer.

Councillor Mrs. J. Barker proposed, and Alderman Mrs. M. E. Henn seconded, that Mr. Robins be duly elected Treasurer and that he receive the proposed honorarium, and that the Patron, President, Vice-Presidents and Elected Members should be re-elected. This was carried unanimously.

This concluded the business of the Annual General Meeting.

The Curator, Miss Enid Porter, then showed by means of an epidiascope and described a number of photographs of old Cambridge selected from the large collection now housed in the Museum. At the conclusion of her talk she was thanked by the Patron, Sir Hamilton Kerr, Bt.

### HON. TREASURER'S REPORT, 1968-69

The accounts for the financial year ended 31st March, 1969, show a similar pattern of expenditure as for earlier years. Work has been done to re-decorate the Museum Cottage and the Museum fittings have been added to.

A considerable drop in expenditure for National Insurance is accounted for by the claim made by Mr. Wright for Selective Employment Tax paid since its inception. There has also been a small drop in the amount of Loan Interest paid.

No additional repayment of loan was made during the year. Balances have been retained to meet payments to the Sundry Creditors and for current payments pending the receipt of Grants.

On the Income side it will be noticed that the grant of £250 from the County Council for 1968 has been included in the current year's Accounts. Thus the final balances of the two years should be adjusted by that amount to present a true comparison.

Here I should like to record our thanks to all those who have supported the Museum by their Grants and Donations, also the members who loyally continue their annual subscriptions. A list of their names is included within this Report. £150 of this money has been added to the Museum Purchase Account which now stands at £125 15s. 9d.

Due to current financial restrictions the City Corporation grant was reduced to £1,750. This grant is vital to our existence and I tender our thanks for the consideration we receive. But I express the hope that it may be restored at least to its former level as soon as possible so that the Museum may fulfil its purpose in the life of our City.

## CURATOR'S REPORT

The twelve months ending 31st March, 1969 have been very busy and, judged by attendance figures, successful ones. A record number of visitors—8,365—came to the Museum during the period, while the total of school children attending in organised parties amounted to 1,254. Most of the children came from schools in the City and County, 667 of them being taught, on their visits, by the Museums Teacher, Mr. D. H. B. Dowdy. The number of enquiries for information, on a wide variety of subjects, rose to well over 1,400.

Two exhibitions were held during the year: The Cambridgeshire Scene and Some Recent Accessions. Several talks were given by the Curator to adult classes in Village Colleges and to various organisations.

Arising from the hoped-for conservation of the old pumping station in Cheddars Lane, and its use as a museum of technology, the Cambridge Society for Industrial Archaeology was founded towards the end of 1968 and already has a large membership. The Curator serves on the committee. The aims of the society, are in many ways complementary to those of the Folk Museum.

Some new cases have been made and installed in the Museum, but it is still desirable to have an additional one in the Fenland Room in order that small objects may be more safely displayed.

The problem of finding space to display our ever-increasing collections is becoming more acute, and it is to be hoped that an answer to it may be found in the not too distant future. Two rooms leading from the Fenland Room have to be used as storage rooms. If these could be freed by the provision of storage space elsewhere, the difficulty would be greatly eased. The larger of the two cellars, if this could be better ventilated and fitted with racks, might serve to contain the reserve collection. Duplicates of some of our exhibits must be retained because these are so often requested for loan exhibitions to schools; several such loans were made during the past twelve months.

Among the accessions received in the past year, one of the most interesting is the vagrancy board from Rampton. This hung on the front wall of the first house on the Willingham side of the village. The house, demolished in 1938, bore the date 1677 and the initials W.A., said to be those of William Alcock. The board, stored since 1938 in the donor's shed, was originally painted with the legend, under the heading RAMPTON: "All vagrants who are seen beging (sic) in this town will be apprehended and punished as the law directs." The lettering now stands out clearly in relief, due to the effect of weathering on the unpainted portions of the board.

The doll presented by Lady Keynes has a somewhat unusual history. It was purchased and given to her in 1950 by her husband, Sir Geoffrey Keynes, having formerly belonged to an old lady who was discovered in her Fingeringhoe cottage eight years after she had died. The doll was found, among her possessions, in a box with a note that it was given to her by her dear mother in 1845.

Reference to the list of accessions printed at the end of the Annual Report will show that the Purchase Fund has been used to acquire several new exhibits. Among these is a rare photograph, 51 cm. by 60.9 cm., taken in c.1902 of the Trumpington Mill which stood in Long Road until it was finally demolished shortly before 1914. The photograph, which was sent to a local sale in aid of the Save the Children Fund, won first prize in a competition and shows, in addition to the mill, some women doing their washing in the gardens of the Mill Cottages, and some children playing at marbles.

Another purchase was that of the stuffed alligator used as a chemist's sign. Among other items added to our pharmaceutical

collection is the fine brass-bound mahogany pill machine, presented by Mr. T. W. Bagshawe, and the turned wooden pill finisher given by the Chief Pharmacist of Addenbrooke's Hospital where it was formerly in use. Mrs. J. Barker has given a china medicine spoon of c.1900 and a medicine glass, both in use, until recently, in the sanatorium of the Leys School. Because chemists changed, in March 1968, to the metric system of weight and measurement, it was thought desirable that these two objects, both marked according to the old system, should be preserved.

Our collection of domestic objects has been increased by the gift of an unusual tea caddy of 1880, made of mosaic or purple marble glass, and of a patent raisin stoner of 1895. Two very fine 18th century copper warming pans, from Pymoor near Ely, were acquired by purchase, as was also an iron crusie-type lamp, formerly used in a stable at Fordham.

By the bequest of the late Mr. R. Fleet Turner, the Museum received a portrait in oils of his grandfather, George Fleet (1818–1885), Head Porter of Magdalene College from 1872. He had, however, been an employee of the College for long before that date. It is very fitting that the portrait should be in the Museum because George Fleet was a regular visitor to the building when it was the White Horse Inn. His signature, scratched with the landlord's diamond-set ring, is still to be seen on one of the glass panes of the former bar.

The Curator is very grateful to visitors to the Museum, and others, who have offered to take photographs of buildings, etc., which are due to be pulled down in the near future. She would welcome even more co-operation in the task of keeping the Museum's records up to date. If anyone knowing of any imminent demolition would inform her, she could then arrange for photographs to be taken. For lack of such information it was not possible, for example, to photograph the cottages which have now disappeared from Malcolm Street.
