THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE PERIOD 1ST APRIL, 1974 TO 31ST MARCH, 1975

Proceedings of the Annual General Meeting, 1974

THE TWENTY-NINTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Association, being the thirty-ninth since the opening of the Museum, was held on Tuesday, 22nd October, 1974, at 2.30 p.m. in the Council Chamber of the Guildhall, Cambridge. The Mayor, Councillor P. J. Warren, President of the Folk Museum Association, presided.

Apologies were received from Mr. A. W. Arundale, Councillors Mrs. J. Barker and B. W. George, Dr. G. H. S. Bushnell, Mr. S. C. Bowles, Dr. G. E. Daniel, Sir Hamilton Kerr, Hon. Councillor Mrs. M. E. Henn, Mrs. J. Northcott, Mrs. S. Purkis.

Before proceeding to the business of the meeting, the Chairman referred to the great loss sustained by the Association by the recent death of Mr. John Saltmarsh, who had served on the Council of Management since the Museum opened in 1936. For many years he had represented the Council of the Senate of the University before being elected a Vice-President. A regular attendant at meetings and a frequent visitor to the Museum, he would be greatly missed. The Chairman referred, also, to the death in July, 1974 of Mr. N. O. Higgins, a life member of the Association. He asked members to stand in silence.

The Minutes of the previous Annual General Meeting, held on 23rd October, 1973, which were printed in the Annual Report already circulated to members, were then confirmed and signed.

The Treasurer, Mr. P. J. Morton, referred members to the Balance Sheet and audited Statement of Accounts printed in the Annual Report. The most important change in these accounts was, he said, due to the transfer of Abbey House to the City Corporation. Mr. E. Harmer raised the question of the presentation of the accounts. The Treasurer said that the modern method was to present them vertically instead of horizontally. Asked about grants from local authorities, Mr. Morton replied that he had made application to the South Cambridgeshire District Council who had informed him, on 7th October, 1974, that the matter would be discussed when the Council was looking into the matter of grants for the period 1975-6. He said that he had applied to the County Council for an increased grant. The audited accounts were then adopted by the meeting on the proposal of Councillor Mrs. Nicol seconded by Mrs. N. R. David.

During the consideration of the Annual Report, the Curator referred to the matter of security in the Museum and said that, following two thefts during the past year, this gave some cause for anxiety. She had been informed by the Security Officer of the City Police that, ideally, the Museum should be provided with strong metal-framed cases and that an alarm system should be installed. The Chairman said that the cost of this would be very high, and he thought that any money available should go to the provision of storage space. Councillor Mrs. Nicol asked whether steps should not be taken, in consultation with the City Architect, for, at least, the gradual provision of improved cases. The Chairman promised to look into the matter. The Annual Report was then adopted on the proposal of Councillor Mrs. J. Fitch seconded by Mr. G. O. Vinter.

Appointment of Auditors

Mr. E. E. Harmer proposed that Messrs. Chater & Myhill be re-appointed auditors for the year ending 31st March, 1975. Seconded by Councillor Mrs. Lipstein the motion was carried.

Election of Officers

It was proposed from the Chair, and carried, that Sir Hamilton Kerr be re-elected Patron of the Museum. Councillor Mrs. Nicol proposed, and Mr. G. O. Vinter seconded, that the President, Vice-Presidents, Elected Members and Treasurer be re-elected. This was carried. It was proposed from the Chair, and carried, that Mr. F. A. Reeve be elected as a Vice-President in the place of the late Mr. Saltmarsh. Mr. Reeve, until 31st March, 1974, had been a member of the old County Council and had represented that body on the Council of Management for a number of years. It was also proposed that Mr. E. E. Harmer who, for several years prior to 31st March, 1974, had been one of the City Council's representatives, should join the number of Elected Members.

There being no other business, the meeting was then closed and Mr. P. W. Gathercole, curator of the University Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology, gave a most interesting talk on the history and the future aims of his museum for which Councillor Mrs. J. Fitch expressed the members' thanks and appreciation.

TREASURER'S REPORT

We ended the year with a deficit of £370 compared with a surplus of £120 for the previous year. Our balances at the bank were depleted by almost £1,000, ending the year with a net overdraft of £580. Although there was this large outflow of funds, part will be made up in the current year when a special grant of £600 will be receivable from the City Corporation.

During the year we had a burglar alarm system installed at a cost of almost £600, for which sum a grant will be obtained.

We were, in common with many other bodies, affected by the inflationary trends; to help to overcome this the admission fees to the Museum were increased from January 1st, 1975.

On the income side, the total income, apart from grants, was marginally less. We lost our rental income from Abbey House of £480 per annum but, on the other hand, we received an increased sum from donations and subscriptions. Takings at the Museum, including sale of guide books and postcards, improved from £555 to £835.

The curator's salary is now based on local government scales, as a result of which expenditure in the year, on this item, increased from £1,250 to £2,012. Increases overall were seen in many other items of expenditure, and we have done well to contain the costs to the figures shown in the accounts.

We are, of course, grateful to those people and bodies who subscribe so generously to Museum funds, and to the Councils who make grants to us. A list of names appears at the end of the Report.

CURATOR'S REPORT

Attendance at the Museum in the year ended 31st March, 1975, reached the record figure of 15,225. Student visitors from this country and overseas numbered 2,698 while 1,861 children attended in organised groups from schools in Cambridge, Cambridgeshire, Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex, Hertfordshire, Leicestershire, London and Staffordshire. The Museum was opened in the evening, on several occasions, for the benefit of visitors from local organisations.

Three exhibitions were held during the year: *Town and Gown; Old Cambridge Illustrated* and *H. A. Moden—Cambridge Cartoonist*. For the last-named much original material was kindly lent by Dr. R. G. Friedlander.

The Curator gave a number of talks in the city and county during the year and attended meetings of the Curators' Panel and of the Museums Working Group to discuss the future of all the Cambridgeshire museums. The Museum continued to provide an information service to enquirers by letter, telephone and in person, some 1,036 enquiries being dealt with.

The installation of a burglary alarm and of an alarm system linked to several display cases has relieved the Curator of a good deal of anxiety regarding security.

Twelve new postcards were published during the year. They are reproductions in sepia of some of the Museum's drawings and prints of old Cambridge, and are proving very popular.

Accessions received during the year are listed at the end of the Annual Report. Notable among them is the large collection of sale bills, given by Mr. E. Mynott, relating to Cambridgeshire properties from the 1850s to 1880s. These provide useful information on farms, farmhouses, inns, mills, breweries, etc., and on field names. They are accompanied by maps and, in the case of the sale of local mansions, by coloured lithographs of the houses.

The brass plate of the first University Typewriting Office at 33 Trinity Street was preserved by the donor, Miss M. Sutherland, when the office was demolished in 1958 for extensions to Trinity College. The plate bears the name of Mrs. Marshall, who established the office in 1892. On her retirement in 1900, her name was scored through on the plate—presumably in the interests of economy—and that of her successor, Miss Pate, engraved below.

Mr. E. A. Phillips kindly presented one of the arm badges worn by the men formerly employed by the University Boat Club to run along the tow-path carrying the oarsmen's clothes to the finishing post. Records of the Boat Club contain several entries of payments made to the "badge men".

Another badge, found under Banham's boathouse during demolition and given by Mr. D. Larkin, has been identified as that of the 1st or 8th Cambridgeshire Volunteer Rifle Corps. These Corps, raised in Cambridge in 1860, were amalgamated in 1862 as the 1st Administrative Battalion, Cambridgeshire Volunteers; in 1881 they became the 1st (Cams.) Volunteer Battalion, the Suffolk Regiment.

The Electrolux refrigerator given by Mr. D. Hart is the first model produced by the company. It is, fortunately, small enough to go into the kitchen; the offer of a 19th century ice box had, unfortunately, to be refused on account of its size and weight. It eventually went out of the county. Our shortage of space is an ever-increasing problem and one for which a solution must be found before long.

A very welcome gift was that of the two aldermen's gowns formerly worn by the late Alderman K. C. Kerridge and presented by his widow. A special display case has been made for them and they make a handsome addition to Room 4.

Our thanks are due to Mr. R. S. Burrows and his brother for presenting the five framed watercolours painted by their mother, Margaret Wadsworth, between 1900 and 1905, probably at art classes. Two of them—the Wrestlers Inn, Petty Cury and Falcon Yard—are excellent copies of 19th century engravings.

The large, garlanded stone urn which stood at the top of the Norwich Union building at the corner of St. Andrew's Street and Downing Street, was brought to the Museum, when the building was demolished in 1974, and set up in the yard. The urn, along with the other fine stonework on the Norwich Union premises, was probably made in Sawston in 1909-10.

A large collection of extremely interesting photographs of town and university events between the years 1905 and 1933, made by the late Mr. J. E. Scott, was received from Mrs. M. Snazle and Miss G. Scott and is a welcome addition to our photographic collection. Thanks are due, too, to Ms. A. E. Jones who has continued to add to that collection by the gift of photographs of streets and buildings threatened with change or demolition.

From Magdalene College we have received, on long-term loan, a number of items which were formerly in Toft Manor, home of the late Mr. G. M. Macfarlane-Grieve. They include a collection of miniature horses and other animals made by Mr. Macfarlane-Grieve's sisters when, as children, they lived in Impington Hall at the turn of the century, books of the children's own drawings, table games, a Victorian fitted picnic basket and a number of domestic objects.

The University Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology has placed in the Museum, on long-term loan, certain objects which are more suitable for display in a folk museum. They include 19th century wooden gingerbread moulds, pastry crimpers, a replica of a wicker bed-bug trap and the signs, painted by Richard Hopkins Leach in the 1840s, of three Cambridge inns: the Man Loaded with Mischief on Madingley Road, the Hop Bine in Fair Street and the John Gilpin in Gold Street.
