Proceedings of the Annual General Meeting 1980

THE FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING of the Assocoation, being the THE FORTY-FIFTH ANNUAL GENERAL was held on Thursday, 23rd October, in the Guildhall, Cambridge. The President, Mr. P.J. Warren, was in the Chair.

Chairman's Report :

The Chairman welcomed everyone to the Meeting and introduced Miss K.J. Brown as the new Museum Assistant. He also welcomed Miss P. Booth as the new representative of the Tourist Office, replacing Mrs. Ridout. The Chairman then introduced Mr. P.S. Middleton as the Speaker for the afternoon.

Minutes:

The Minutes of the forty-fourth Annual General Meeting held on the 1st November, 1979 as reproduced in the Annual Report, were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet 1979/80:

The Treasurer submitted the audited Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ended 31st March, 1980, and reported that he had nothing further to add. However he apologised for several printing errors which had occurred in his report and pointed out the large deficit incurred. Mrs. Sargeant then asked the Treasurer whether we had received the County Council grant for this year. The Treasurer replied that he had received an increased grant of £450, but added that the County Council was not prepared to give a revenue grant for the year 1980/81. Instead the Museum could only apply for a project grant. The Chairman enlarged on this by saying that the County Council had recently advertised the availability of this type of grant. The Curator, as a member of the County Museums Advisory Committee, was already aware of this grant and had two possible projects in mind. Mr. Pollard asked the Treasurer whether it would be possible to apply for an increased South Cambs. R.D.C. annual grant. The Treasurer replied that this had been tried over the years without success. The Chairman recommended that when the success the chairman recommended that the success the chairman recommended the success the success the chairman recommended that the success the recommended that when applying for the grant this year he should again place particular emphasis on the icular emphasis on the large number of school children who were admitted free of charge to the Museum annually.

The Treasurer was thanked by the Chairman for his wise handling of the accounts added that the Museum and the Chairman for his wise handling of the accounts and added that the Museum was indebted to him for his valuable work. Resolved that the Museum was indebted to him for his valuable work.

Annual Report of the Council of Management :

Mr. Wilson said that he had nothing further to add to his report as printed in the Annual Report, except that he had made Report, except that he had made an appeal for old tin-plate toys through the 'Cambridge Evening News', as was suggested by Mr. Pollard at the last Annual General Meeting. This was followed by a similar appeal in the 'Independent Press' six weeks later but so far only one person has come foreward, donating two complete 'Hornby' clockwork trainsets made in c. 1935.

Mrs. Sargeant asked the Curator whether the Museum had thought of trying to obtain sub-standerd toys from shops which specialise in this field. Mr. Wilson replied that this possibility had already been looked into but he considered the price of this type of

tin-plate toy still too high.

Cllr. Mrs. May, referring to the Council of Management report, asked whether the four display cases on order had now been received. The Curator replied that two cases have been installed and was now awaiting delivery of the two remaining cases within the next few weeks. Mr. Stubbings commented favourably on the newly opened attic room, a photograph of which appeared at the end of the Annual Report.

Resolved that the Annual Report of the Council of Management for the year ended

31st March, 1980, be adopted as a true record.

The Annual General Meeting was followed by an illustrated talk given by Mr. P.S. Middleton on the Roman period in the Fens. His instructive and most interesting talk was much appreciated by all and Mr. Middleton answered many questions put to him by his audience, who afterwards thanked him. The Chairman asked the Speaker whether he would be prepared to give further talks on this subject in future, which he said he would do with pleasure.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The accounts to 31st March, 1981 show a surplus of £1,317 compared with a deficit of £518 the previous year. A number of factors have contributed to the surplus, the

main ones appearing within this Report.

General running costs have been contained as much as possible during the year, despite increased prices. During the year we lost our two part-time Assistants, and although we subsequently took on a new part-time Assistant, this has resulted in the overall expenditure on salary and related costs being some £1100 down on budget. Additional monies have been spent on replacement postcards, and stocks of guides, postcards etc. now stand at £1,415 compared with £1,058. in March 1980.

During the financial year we received a project grant of £500, from the City of Cambridge, Community Chest, towards the cost of four showcases. Expenditure of

£760. on these cases is reflected under Museum purchases.

Subscription income increased during the year from £218, to £242, but were it not for three new life subscriptions totalling £92, subscription income would have fallen.

We are still very dependent on both the City of Cambridge and the Cambridgeshire County Council for the Grants they give, without which the Museum could not function. We are grateful for their continued support but insofar as the County Council are concerned, we have been informed that they will no longer entertain Grants for

revenue expenditure.

CURATOR'S REPORT

It is pleasing to report that attendance at the Museum for the year ending 31st March, 1951, was 18,767, an increase of 1,007 visitors compared with the previous year. A total of 1,215 Cambridgeshire children in organised schoolparties visited the Museum and 1,589 from outside the County, the latter figure showing a substantial increase compared with the previous year. However, it has been evident during the past year that more than 900 people decided not to visit the Museum once it became apparent that an admission fee was charged.

A total of 5,700 publications were sold during the year, including posters, booklets,

cut-outs and postcards.

Following the resignations of both Miss Delaney and Mrs. Woods in August last year, it was necessary to run the Museum single-handed for some time, until the appointment of a new part-time Assistant. Miss K.J. Brown commenced work on 30th September, Three autiliary to work an average of 29 hours per week, to include alternate week-end duties.

Three exhibitions were held: 'Children's Games and Books', 'The First World War and 'Witchcraft and Folk-lore'. The exhibition covering the Great War was mounted in co-operation wild large and sold of documents postered the Cambridgeshire Military Historical Group. It consisted of documents, postcards, posters, uniforms and a few weapons used by British, French and German forces. This was the first time an exhibition had been accepted from an outside organisation and was the first time an exhibition had been accepted from an exhibition outside organisation and it proved to be very popular with visitors. The exhibition entitled Witchcraft and Falls entitled 'Witchcraft and Folklore' which many visitors found to be very interesting received a favourable writer. received a favourable write-up in an article published in the 'Cambridge Evening News'. It contained not only exhibition in an article published in the 'Cambridge Evening News'. It contained not only exhibits, kindly donated by the British Folklore Society but also many local objects which had a loc many local objects which had been discovered built into houses with the intention of protecting the occupants from witchcraft and other ills.

During the previous financial year, an application was made to the Lotteries and menities Committee for a great year, an application was made to the Lotteries and the committee for a great year. Amenities Committee for a grant to cover the cost of manufacture of four urgently needed display cases. The Museum I. needed display cases. The Museum has now taken delivery of all four cases, which make it possible to safely display more it possible to safely display more exhibits behind glass.

During the month of September another attempt was made to break into at least one display case. However the Curator's suspicions were raised when three youths entered the Museum. It soon became apparent that attempts were being made to open display cases using various keys and a knife. The police were called and the three youths were arrested. It was discovered that a nineteenth century knife and fork combination

had been stolen. The stolen exhibit has now been returned.

Following two appeals made in the 'Cambridge Evening News' and the 'Independent Press' for readers to donate old tin-plate toys, two persons came forward wishing to give several interesting toys. Two pre-war 'Hornby' dockwork train-sets were added to the Museum's collection of toys, as well as a child's tin-plate humming top. The trainsets came complete with track, station and tunnel. A large case, which was kindly donated by the Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology the previous year, was refurbished for these items and the train-sets now make an attractive display in one of the children's rooms.

The Museum received further publicity in a series of feature articles published in the 'Cambridge Evening News', dealing with unusual objects in the Museum's collections. In an article entitled "Down Your Street", which appeared in the first issue of the 'Cambridge Weekly', the Museum was also given coverage regarding the history

of the building and nature of its exhibits.

Improvements were made to the exterior of the building by having the words 'FOLK MUSEUM' and 'ENTRANCE' painted over the front entrance and 'THE CAMBRIDGE AND COUNTY FOLK MUSEUM' on the large moulded oval plaque facing Castle Street. Grant aid has been applied for from the County Museums Advisory Committee, to have a four feet high oval advertising sign made, to read 'THE CAMBRIDGE AND COUNTY FOLK MUSEUM'. This sign will be mounted to the exterior wall facing Nothampton Street in place of the original sign, which was painted over several years ago. A further grant has been requested from the above mentioned Committee to cover the cost of a new display case.

The Museum has again given assistance and supplied items on loan to Hinchingbrooke Comprehensive School, several Women's Institutes, Netherhall School and various local societies and groups. Mr. P.S. Middleton, a lecturer on the Fens, and Speaker at the last Annual General Meeting, frequently calls in to borrow several Fen tools and implements, which he uses to illustrate his talks. B.B.C. Television, Bristol, recently borrowed a large copper raised-pie mould, which was used in a programme entitled "The Country House Kitchen". The Museum received a fee of £10 for the loan of

We are again grateful to the Assistant-Bursar of Clare College, who kindly donated this item. an interesting collection of nineteenth century copper jelly moulds, which make a welcome addition to the Museum's varied collection of cookery moulds. Our sincere thanks must also go to the 'Cambridgeshire Collection' and the City Lending Library for their help in supplying the Museum with four books dealing with the history of the Fens. These were written by Mr W.H. Barrett at the turn of the century and later edited by Miss Enid Porter, the previous Curator. The Curator would also like to express his gratitude to the many visitors who contributed gifts during the past year, the principle ones of which are listed at the end of the Annual Report. Among the few accessions acquired by purchase is a so-called 'Penny' toy, made of tin-plate and comprising as engine and two trucks, in mint condition and with their original box. This type of toy was sold during the early part of this century for one or two pennies.


