The Chairman welcomed everyone to the Meeting. Mrs. Sargeant mentioned that there had been some confusion regarding the date in that the Annual General Meeting should have been held on 19th October in Committee Room 2 but was transferred in the record to 20th October and Committee Room 1. Fortunately this had caused no problems as this Room was available and the Secretary apologised and attended on the 19th in case anyone came. The Chairman mentioned that Mr. Reeve had recently undergone major surgery but was now out of hospital and his condition is improving. We are still concerned and all present confirmed their good wishes.

Mr. Warren asked whether condolances had been sent to Mrs. Phillips following the death of her husband. Mr. Wilson replied that this had been done and we had received a letter of thanks from Mrs. Phillips. Mrs. Sargeant then introduced Mr. G. Snelling as the new part-time Museum Assistant.

The Minutes of the forty-seventh Annual General Meeting held on 20th October, 1982, as printed in the Annual Report, were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet 1982/83:

The Treasurer submitted the Audited Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ending 31st March, 1983 and reported he had nothing further to add to the written report. However, Mr. Morton noted that the new rent the Museum pays has this year been increased to £4,500 and that the grant applied for had only been marginally increased by £235. He also reported that income from admissions and sales was well below budget, but that income for the month of September and the first three weeks of October was higher compared with the same period last year. Mr. Morton also forecast a further deficit of £1,000 by the end of the current on the Balance Character and Interest a further deficit of £1,000 by the chief of t on the Balance Sheet gives a false position as this amount was received at the end of March. Mr. Warren felt that the County Council should support the Museum financially but the Chairman replied that the County Council has financed the substantial cost of the new Museum Guide which went on sale at the beginning of July. The Treasurer explained further that the Museum does not receive a great f does not receive a grant from the County towards the running costs, but only towards the costs of projects, when approved and we have received money for several major projects. The Chairman reported that a meeting with Mr. Wilkinson, Chairman of the Amenities and Recreation Committee, Mr. Pollard and herself will shortly take place to discuss the deficit of £700. She had already had an information will shortly take place to discuss the deficit of £700. had already had an informal talk with Mr. Wilkinson who said that he did not realise that the Museum was faced with Museum was faced with such financial difficulties. Mr. Warren thought, as the rest of the Committee does that if the Committee does, that if the rent was increased the annual grant should be increased pro rata.

Mrs. Sargeant said that the rent was deducted at source and that he only receives the nett figure. Mrs. Sargeant said that she had applied to see the Editor of the Town Crier, to do a short

series of articles on the Museum and would ask that subsequent issues should contain vouchers allowing access to the Museum at a reduced rate. The Chairman thanked the City Council for arranging the exterior decorating of the Museum to coincide with the taking of photographs for the new museum guide. Mr. Barrett-Payton further suggested that the County might support us financially in return for exhibiting the archaeological finds from Castle Hill. The Curator explained that the current exhibition was a small one and did not appear to be very popular with visitors.

Mr. Smith, an Associate Member, suggested that Radio Cambridgeshire be informed of any exhibitions planned, to which Mr. Wilson replied that this had already been done several times. also with regards to the current archaeological exhibition. The 'Cambridge Evening News' had given this exhibition a good coverage but this had led to a negligible increase in attendance figures. The majority of visitors tend to spend less than five minutes in the Exhibition Room, even for well advertised exhibitions.

Miss Booth made the suggestion that the Museum's handbill could be packaged up with

other tourist information and placed in all rooms of hotels and guesthouses,

The Treasurer was thanked by the Chairman for his wise handling of the accounts and added

that the Museum was indebted to him for his valuable work.

Resolved that the Audited Statement of Accounts and Balance Sheet for the year ending 31st March, 1983, be adopted as a true record.

Annual Report of the Council of Management:

Mrs. Sargeant had nothing further to add to her report, except that she expressed her thanks to the County Council for the project grant given to the Museum to enable it to publish 10,000 museum guides.

Appointment of the Auditor:

Resolved that Messrs. Chater and Myhill be appointed as Auditors to the Folk Museum for the year ending 31st March, 1984.

Election of Executive Officers:

Resolved that the following Executive Officers be elected: Patron (Prof. E. Miller, in his absence), President (P. J. Warren, O.B.E., M.A.), Vice-Presidents (Mr. F. A. Reeve and Mr. P. J. Morton), Chairman (Mrs. E. A. L. Sargeant), Treasurer (Mr. P. J. Morton). Following the death of Mr. C. K. Phillips it was hoped that a new Vice-President would take up his new responsibilities next year.

Date, time and place of the next Annual General Meeting:

The next Annual General Meeting was arranged for Thursday, 18th October, 1984, in the Guildhall.

Her instructive and most interesting talk on the Roman occupation of Cambridge was much appreciated by all and illustrated with several objects which were unearthed. Miss Taylor then answered many questions put to her by her audience and was thanked by Mrs. Sargeant on behalf of the Committee and warmly applauded by all.

The need to increase public awareness of the Museum has been helped by the current Teddy Bear exhibition and the linked Teddy Bear's picnic on Jesus Green, both of which were planned to be happy, un-stuffy occasions and which have received much praise. I would like to thank all those who contributed bears, those who gave prizes (Thomas Cook, Eaden Lilley, Heffers, Methuen) and the staff in the Amenities and Recreation Department for their active help

The long-term finances are still a problem however and positive policies to develop the potential of the Museum are needed urgently: we have so much to offer in both pleasure and

knowledge.

Physically the property is in good shape now with all major works complete. The new guide book, generously sponsored by the County Council, is a success: at some point we are going to need an improved range of postcards but we need the public first and prosaically a toilet with public access would be a greater priority.

I cannot pretend that my term in office has been easy. I put a lot of time and effort - and found a great source of goodwill - in inaugurating the Friends of the Museum, only to see it subsequently collapse. I still think a Friends group could work and be a source of pleasure for

members, and support the Museum.

Equivalent projects will now be in the capable hands of Eric Barrett-Payton, the Acting-Chairman and our new and already invaluable Secretary to the Trustees, Mary Basham.

In leaving, I would like to thank the Members of the Committee who have been such a help over the crises of recent times. I love the Museum and wish it well for the future.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

The Museum has had another disappointing year financially. The deficit for the twelve months ended 31st March, 1984, was £1,948 compared with a deficit of £1,263 the previous year. The year end bank overdraft of £2,548 and capital deficit of £344 highlight the financial predicament in which the Museum finds itself.

Expenditure has been contained as much as possible and the only figure calling for comment is that for guides, postcards and posters where £3,143 has been spent on a newly designed guide and the printing of 10,000 and posters where £3,143 has been spent on a newly designed by and the printing of 10,000 copies. The cost of this and other minor items was financed by the Cambridgeshire County Council by way of project grant in the sum of £3,330, to whom we are indebted. Total calculated and solve reserve are indebted. Total sales income from the new guides are being earmarked to a new reserve account.

On the income side, though a small increase was seen from both admissions and sales me, the former was still d income, the former was still down substantially on that obtained during 1981/82, and it is disappointing that attenders and it is disappointing that attendances are not being maintained. Though small in comparison with admissions, subscription income in and bodies admissions, subscription income is falling away and we are grateful to those persons and bodies

who continue to support the Museum in this manner. We are also grateful to the two Councils who continue to make revenue grants available e Museum, without which the M

#### CURATOR'S REPORT

Attendance at the Museum for the year ending 31st March, 1984, was 14,722, 580 fewer visitors compared with the previous year. A total of 545 Cambridge children in organised school parties visited the Museum and 991 from outside the City. A large number of leaflets and exhibition posters have been distributed to all the Cambridgeshire schools, but few schools appear to take advantage of the facilities offered. It has also been evident that three County schools cancelled their proposed visits once it became apparent that an admission fee is charged. Also the number of visitors turning away on account of a charge being made has increased steadily over the year. Up to 50% of people are now not prepared to pay the fee, particularly on Bank holidays and week-ends.

A total of 3,637 publications were sold, 345 more compared with the financial year 1982/83. Publications sold included guides, posters, booklets, Shire Albums, cut-outs, postcards and badges. The introduction of the new museum guide, which was put on sale on 28th June last year, has proved to be reasonably popular and 484 were sold over the nine month period. Together with this guide, the old museum guide remained on sale and 200 of these were sold until early March when stocks ran out,

Four exhibitions were held during the year: '19th Century Children's Books'; an exhibition covering archaeological finds from Castle Hill site; 'Posters and Handbills', and 'Victorian Games and Puzzles'.

The Museum received publicity via several articles and references published in local newspapers, the 'Conduit', 'Shopping in East Anglia' magazine, Sarah Payne's recent publication entitled 'Down Your Street', 'The Times Educational Supplement', as well as 'The Observer' magazine. Further credit was received in two recently published books entitled 'Mrs. Cromwell's Cookery Book' and 'Jelly Moulds' by Sally Kevill-Davies. Information about its collections has also been supplied to tourist information centres in East Anglia, the City Library and all branch libraries, the R.A.C., the A.A., the Museums and Galleries Association and other organisations which contact us on a regular basis.

Early last year the Museum was approached by Laura Ashley with a request to supply suitable exhibits on a regular basis for their shop window displays in Trinity Street. Exhibits are supplied on a monthly basis and a regular hiring fee of £35 has been negotiated. The Museum also gains

welcome publicity from the displays.

This year has again seen a high turnover of staff, which has led to the Curator frequently having to run the Museum single-handed and having to work consecutive week-ends. Of the three assistants who have now left, one was taken on a temporary basis and turned out to be a very pleasant and most helpful person. It was also with much regret that Graham Snelling, my last part-time assistant decided to resign in March to take up a full-time post at the British Museum. He was always hard-working, friendly and prepared to undertake any task given.

Again it is regrettable to have to report the theft of a fleam, a 19th century animal bloodletting instrument. This exhibit was removed from a newly refurbished display case, after a

lock had been forced.

The Curator would like to thank the many visitors who contributed gifts during the year, the principal ones of which are listed at the end of the Annual Report.
