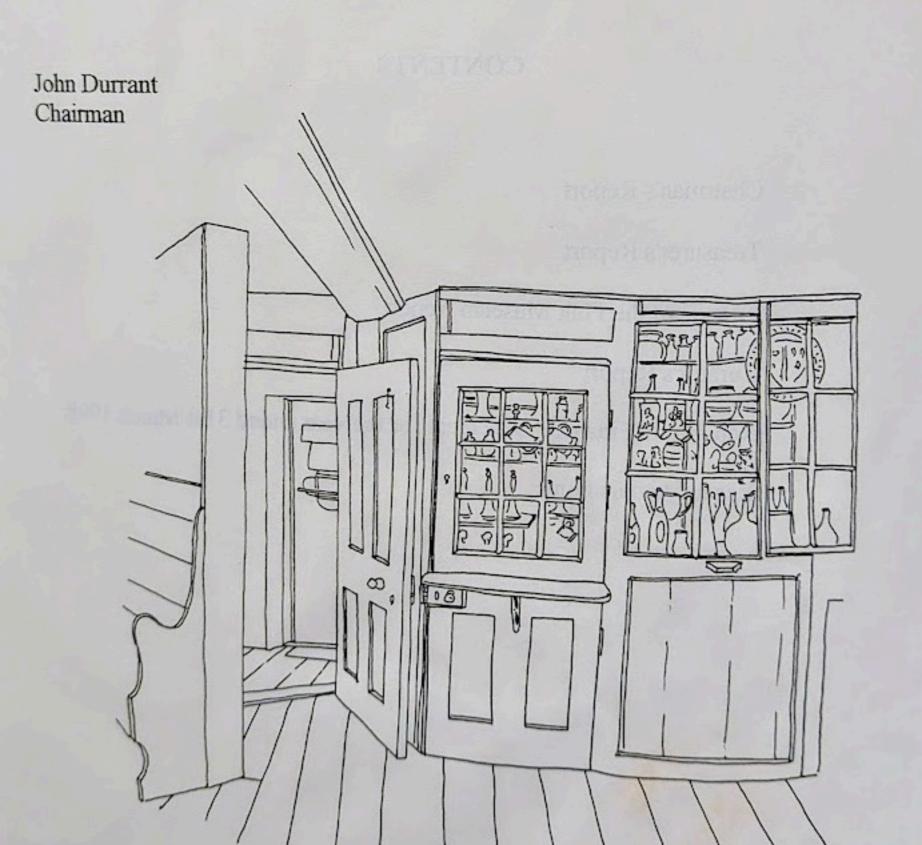

TREASURER'S REPORT

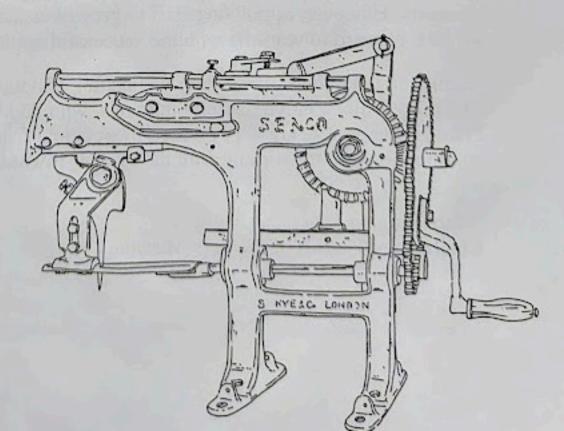
The Museum continues to receive support from Cambridge City Council and South Cambridgeshire District Council, as well as grant aid from Cambridgeshire County Council through the Museums Advisory Committee. This support, as well as the income generated by the Museum itself and various donations has allowed the collection to be maintained, and a social history museum service provided for the public.

The accounts for the financial year ended March 1998 show a satisfactory result. Income increased slightly over the year due to increased grants and subscriptions and fees, supplemented by a modest increase in bank interest, however, admission income declined by 2.5%. Despite inflation, expenditure remained at a similar level, due to efficient management of funds.

The small surplus achieved has raised the Cash at Bank and In-Hand figure. The Museum's reserves are categorised into two headings, unrestricted funds and designated funds. The unrestricted funds are 12,829 which is just adequate and reflects less than 2 months' operational expenditure for the Museum. The designated funds are split into four key headings, reflective of future need. These are Long Term Storage, Internal Refurbishment (such as improved flooring / signage), Technology (for example computers or telecoms), and Redevelopment Expenses. The latter category has been set up as a small fund to be used to seek innovative ways of gaining support from organisations such as the Heritage Lottery Fund.

Throughout the year the Museum's financial matters have been looked after superbly by the continued dedication of Mr Colin McLeish, without whose effort the Museum would not have been as well managed financially. The new Treasurer would particularly like to add thanks to Mr McLeish for his ongoing support.

The Museum is indebted to all the Fry/Fitzgibbon family. As long as I have been involved with the Museum, Pam Fitzgibbon has been working there. She has always been enthusiastic, always a big "Hello, how are you?" when you enter the building, always appearing very confident. Her aunt, Pam Fry, her mother, and her husband, Keith Halls, have become dedicated volunteers, contributing to the Museum with their energy and their enthusiasm. Keith has tolerated the strange hours his wife has had to work; too many weekends, too many evenings, but I have never heard him complain. He has been nothing but supportive to Pam and to the Museum. Pam will be taking maternity leave from July 1998 at the same time as Jenny Tong, the Education Officer. It will be a big change for them, and for the Museum. CURATOR'S REPORT

Collection Management

The collection lies at the heart of every museum activity. Therefore, it is vital that it is preserved by providing the best storage and display conditions possible within the limitations imposed by the building and lack of available funds. Further, in order for the collection to be a useful tool for the study of local history and not just an assembly of interesting old objects, a documentation system must be maintained which allows information about the artefacts to be fully recorded and easily retrieved.

To achieve these ends the staff and volunteers devoted a great deal of time to work on the collection during the year. The existing programme of environmental monitoring was expanded to include surveillance for insect pests. A grant from Cambridgeshire County Council enabled us to purchase storage boxes for the doll collection and a generous anonymous donation from a member of the public allowed us to refurbish the Georgian shop front which has stood, exposed to the elements, in the garden for almost 60 years. Work on documentation continued steadily under the guidance of Becky Proctor.

Exhibitions

The Museum mounted a number of exhibitions during the year. 'Toys and Technology', which was expressly developed to address the needs of schools, continued throughout the summer and autumn. Over Christmas, two different displays were produced; 'Curtain Up' and 'Folklore'. 'Curtain Up' looked at performance in Cambridgeshire ranging from the molly dances whose roots are lost in the mists of time to the modern cinema. We were indebted to members of several local amateur dramatic groups who provided us with information and pictures. 'Folklore' drew on the Museum's unique collection of folklore objects to illustrate local beliefs and to highlight the role of Enid Porter in collecting and disseminating information on this fascinating subject. The exhibition also included items on loan from the Folklore Society, whose collection of objects from the British Isles is currently lodged at the Museum.

Following the success of the 'Victoria Road Show', we continued our outreach work in the city with the 'Arbury Road Show' which was displayed at the Meadows Community Centre and Arbury Court library. We were initially concerned that the area would not be a rich source of history, but our research proved us wrong. Local people were generous in sharing their memories and photograph collections with us and the Museum now holds a file of information about Arbury and Kings Hedges which will be a useful resource for the future. The exhibition was made possible by grants from Cambridge City Council and South Eastern Museums Service. Our outreach work in the villages of South Cambridgeshire continued. The village

shows are part of the project generously funded by South Cambridgeshire District Council which allows us to bring a museum service to the village while developing the Museum's archive of information.

Education

Our education work with both children and adults continued. We were particularly pleased to be involved once more with the Museums and Galleries in Cambridge project (MAGIC). The Museum linked up with the Botanic Gardens to provide two complementary sessions on building technology and materials. Our Education Officer produced a pack of information and work sheets to accompany the sessions which has now been put on sale in the shop so that interested teachers or parents can use the resources independently. Children's activities have continued to be popular and have gained us publicity in the local media.

The Museum's commitment to lifelong learning continues to be important. Staff have developed new talks for adult groups and the range now includes Victorian Cambridge through the diaries of Josiah Chater, The History of Christmas Customs, Cambridgeshire Folklore, Shopping in Cambridge and Town & Gown. As well as serving an educational purpose, these talks also help to promote the Museum and generate much needed income.

Staff

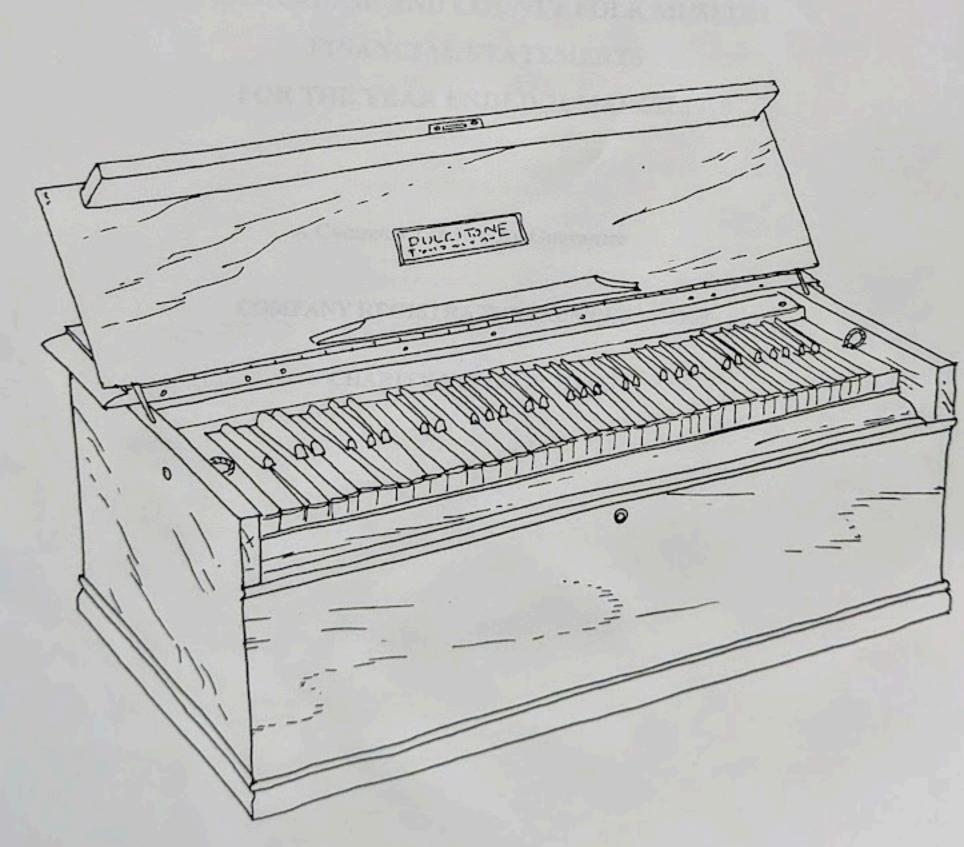
This year saw several changes in the post of Museum Assistant. Lucy Martin left to undertake cataloguing for the British Antarctic Survey and we were joined by Sarah Jeffery who had been working for English Heritage at Denny Abbey. Sarah left after fulfilling her six month contract and was replaced by Polly White. Each of our assistants has brought new knowledge and skills to the Museum and we should be most satisfied that the Museum can continue to attract such well qualified and dedicated staff.

Redevelopment

We began the year by submitting our bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund towards project development and feasibility studies. In the meantime we set about fundraising with an 'Adopt an Object' scheme which was launched in May. The scheme encouraged members of the public to 'adopt' their favourite object. In return for a fee they received an adoption certificate and a picture of their chosen object. The idea proved popular with both local people and tourists and our objects have promote the scheme to local businesses were also developed. Unfortunately, our appeared to change its funding criteria during the year, leading to the withdrawal of in 1998 and when these are available we will review our plans.

These are just a few of the projects that the Museum has tackled this year. None of them would have been possible without the dedication of the staff and volunteers. I would therefore like to thank the staff, Becky Proctor, Jenny Tong, Tom McPherson, Lucy Martin, Sarah Jeffery and Polly White who have all worked so hard and with enthusiasm throughout the year and the dedicated volunteers who have supported us.

The management council have pleasure in presenting their annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 1998.

Management council

The members of the management council are set out on page 1.

Management council responsibilities

Company law requires the management council to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charity's incoming resources and application of resources during the year and of its state of affairs at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is in appropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The responsibilities of the trustees include keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 1985 and the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the charity's assets and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and breaches of law and regulations.

Results and dividends

The surplus for the year amounted to £6,832 as shown on page 5. The memorandum of association does not permit the payment of any dividend.

Review of the business

The charity is principally engaged as custodian and administrator of a social history museum in the City of Cambridge. The museum exists to collect, document, preserve, exhibit and interpret material evidence and associated information from the seventeenth century to the present day for the benefit of the public and to carry out exhibitions on behalf of South Cambridgeshire District Council. The geographical area covered by the collecting policy of the museum is the City of Cambridge and the County of Cambridgeshire.

This year, the museum submitted a bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund for assistance towards the costs of feasibility studies for the redevelopment plans. The plans aim to provide improved conditions for the collections as well as updating visitor and staff facilities. Unfortunately, the bid did not meet with success because of changing priorities within the Heritage Lottery Fund during the year. The museum nevertheless pressed ahead with guidance emerges from the Heritage Lottery Fund in 1998.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting by Charities'. This is the first year of adoption of the SORP and comparative figures have been re-formatted accordingly.

Voluntary Income

Cash donations, gifts and legacies are included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities as they are received. The value of voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

Grant Income

Grant income is recognised as soon there is reasonable assurance of receipt.

Equipment

Expenditure on museum equipment is charged in the financial statements as the liability arises.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual values, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives to the business. The annual depreciation rates and methods are as follows:

Office equipment - 25% reducing balance

Museum equipment - 25% reducing balance

Storage heaters - 25% reducing balance

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost is determined on a first- in, first-out basis. Net realisable value is based on estimated selling price, less any further costs of realisation.

TRUSTEES' REMUNERATION AND REIMBURSED EXPENDITURE

The trustees were not entitled to and did not receive any remuneration from the charity during the year. Reasonable out of pocket expenses were reimbursed in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution for travel and subsistence.

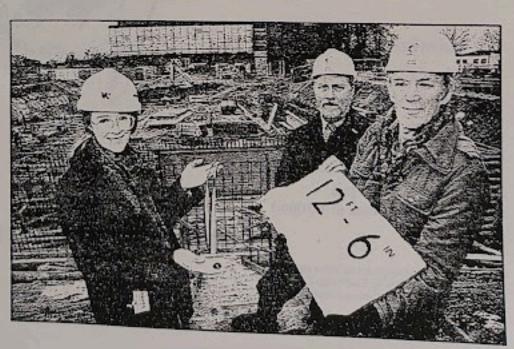

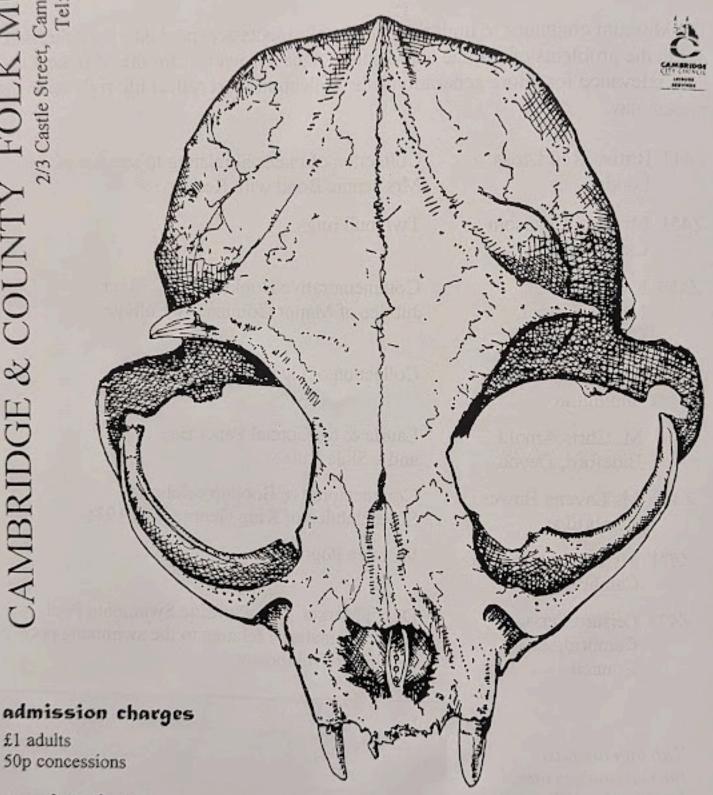
