## **Alfred Tillyard**

Born in Norwich. Taught at the Leys School. Called to the Bar, but never practiced. Edited the Cambridge Independent Press. Elected to the town council in 1895. He also served as a county councillor and as a governor of the Perse School. Mr. Tillyard was especially appointed to consider the question of amalgamating the borough with Chesterton. Elder of St. Columba's Presbyterian Church. Tillyard's son was Master of Jesus College.





## **Supporting Evidence**

Spalding's Street and General Directory of Cambridge, 1874, (see image below) shows Fitzwilliam Terrace, No. 3, as occupied by 'Tillyard, Mrs.' Mrs Mary Tillyard was the widow of Isaac Tillyard. In 1851, they lived at Elm Hill, Norwich. Isaac was a 'Shoemaker employing (64) Men' [1851 Census]. Isaac and Mary's eldest son, Alfred Isaac Tillyard [Aged 9 in the 1861 Census], was educated at Norwich School under Rev Dr A. Jessop. He entered St John's College, Cambridge, on 10 May 1871. He was admitted a Scholar of the College on 14 June 1873, taking his degree in the First Class of the Classical Tripos of 1875 (8<sup>th</sup> Classic); M.A. in 1878. [Source: The Eagle Magazine].
