


Description

- O1, Two Roman glass vessels, one an elaborately cut goblet of pure white glass, the other a jug with a conical body waved in diagonal lines were found in a Roman cemetery at Barnwell. These vessels were passed into the collection of Felix Slade F.S.A. (No further information regarding a cemetery at Barnwell).
- 2. Roman glass vase found in the vicinity of Barnwell, now in the British Museum. These vases are usually globular or four sided, with ornaments occasionally, or with names of the makers in relief upon the base. This particular example is hexagonal.

Description

1. Nos 1 - 14 Park Terrace were built as part of the Park Terrace development (see also TL 45 NE 57, 59) Nos 7 & 8 were completed in 1831, Nos 1 - 6 in 1835 and Nos 9 - 14 in 1839 - 1840. They are all of three storeys with basements and some have attics. The walls are of gault brick and the roofs are slate covered. "Especially worthy of preservation." The 2 terraces, Houses Nos 1-6 and 9-14 are loftier than the foregoing, have taller sash-hung windows and parapet-walls. Their most prominent feature is a cast iron covered balcony extending the full length of the first floor. Many of the houses have small additions to the back. Inside, generally the entrance-passage widens out towards the back to contain the staircase. On the ground floor is one front and one back room; the main room is on the first floor, the full width of the front and lit by three windows. The small front gardens were originally fenced by railings on the dwarf walls between brick piers.

Description

Palaeolithic implements, probably Acheulean, found at Barnwell include:- a magnificent, abraded hand axe found by a gravel digger in 1878, two abraded, roughly flaked hand axes found on the site of the Festival Theatre, a portion of ribbone (?elephant), artificially sharpened at one end, found in 1862 at a depth of 12ft with bones of elephant, hippopotamus, and rhinoceros. All implements are in the Sedgewick Museum, Cambridge.

Parker's Piece had belonged to the town since 1613, when it was obtained from Trinity Colllege in exchange for the land where the Wren Library now stands. Parker was the tenant farmer who was renting the land from Trinity at the time.

To the south of Front Court is Chapman's Garden, thickly planted with trees with an open culvert along one side, bringing water from Hobson's Conduit to the pool in the paddock, and then on to Christ's College.

In 1746 there is a small bath house, and the garden laid out with a series of walks. Today (2000)entrance to the college passes through a narrow strip of lawn with flowering cherry trees and shrubs against the College walls. There is no planting in Front Court.

New Court, formerly the entrance court was enclosed in 1824 and now has a perennial herb garden consisting of low raised brick beds set in the brick and cobble pattern of the court. Chapman's Garden has a path along which is a white and red flower garden. The tree planting in this garden gives some indication of the 120 tree species planted in the college garden. North Court is accessed through a tunnel from New Court. Here in a sunken oval lawn are three magnificent trees

Description

1. Downing College was founded by the will of Sir George Downing who died in 1749, but the granting of the charter was delay ed by litigation until 1800. The building was begun in 1807 to the designs of William Wilkins, on a "campus" type plan which is the earliest in the world. The design was never completed as originally envisaged, but the ranges were completed by EH Barry in C19 (1874 -1876). The N side of the quadrangle was begun in 1930 and completed in 1953, but the S side remains open. The Wilkins buildings are successful examples of the C19 revived Greek style. Grade 1. The buildings are generally of two storeys, some with cellars and attics. The principle elevations are of Ketton stone ashlar, the rear walls of gault brick and the roofs are slate covered.

- 4. Downing College (Founded C19 (AD 1800)) (NAT).
- 5. The money to build this college came from the fortune of Sir George Downing (who also built Downing Street in London) via his grandson who left it in his will in 1749 to a succession of cousins. If all of them died without having produced children, the money was to be used to found a Cambridge college. None of the cousins had children, but the foundation of the college was severely delayed when the widow of one of them refused to give up the estate. The legal battle lasted until 1800 and used a large proportion of the money. The result was that only part of the grand neoclassical court that had been planned could be built. The east and west ranges were constructed, facing one another across a large expanse of garden. The north side was built in the 1950s, and the court still remains open along its southern edge.

Description

1. Downing Terrace, Nos 41 - 57 Lensfield Road, consist of 13 houses generally of two storeys with basements, except where altered with walls of gault brick and slate covered roofs. Built to a symmetrical design in 1819. The four houses at the W end were remodelled and heightened to three storeys late in the same century.

Terrace comprises a narrow double fronted house forming the centrepiece with a wall arcade of lofty narrow arches embracing the openings on basement, ground and first floors, and six houses either side, each house being of one and a half bays under the modular control of a continuous wall arcade. 2 & 3. The Railway Station was built in 1845 in Italianate style. It is of 1 and 2 storeys and built of gault brick with stone and stucco dressings. The roofs are slate covered. The building was originally symmetrical on plan and in elevation, an open arcaded way on the E. matched that which survives on the W. and trains drew up in the former and vehicles in the latter. To supplement the narrow platform in around 1850 a Tiber island platform was added on the E. This was removed in 1863 and the E. arcade demolished to give space for widening the platform. At the same time offices were added N. and S. of the buildings that remained. The platform was lengthened in 1893 and then again in 1908.

The W. front of the original station contains a continuous arcade of fifteen round headed arches from end to end and had a heavy unbroken crowning entablature. The roof does not show.

- 4. Built in 1845 in an Italianate styles with arcaded façade, design attributed to the architects Sancton Wood or Francis Thompson. Each arch spandrel has a boss with the arms of one of University colleges, the university itself, or various local dignitaries. A number of refurbishments have been carried out to provide for modern requirements. The main platform is 500m, said to be the longest in the country. Grade II listed building.
- 5. Cambridge railway station was first built by the Eastern Counties Railway around 1845, with further goods depots and engine sheds added at a later date. The station building is constructed in white gault brick, with a stone cornice, and a colonnade at the front of the building that originally provided access for carriages. The building was remodelled in 1863 and again in 1908 when the booking hall was extended. In 1971 the colonnade was largely walled in and the platform canopy replaced. An engine shed and sidings were built adjacent to the northern part of the station by 1848, and a row of offices and workshops has been added to the west of the shed by 1880. The 1:500 OS map of 1886 depicts workshops, cranes and water columns. By the time of the 1901 OS map, sidings had been added further to the W as far as Tenison Road, and red brick offices had been built on the north side of Station Road. A very detailed plan of c. 1946 shows full details of the facilities in the area, including air raid shelters. The engine shed and most f the other railway related structures have since been demolished, with the exception of a former office building (now Sleepers Hotel) and some of the 1930s built former workshops and stores to the W of the site of the engine shed. A goods shed and other facilities belonging to the Great Northern Railway were further south, in the apex between Station Road and Hills Road. The OS 1:500 map of 1886 depicts coal yards, cattle pens and a crane.
- 6. In July 1845, the first trains made their way into Cambridge from both London and Norwich. Two years later one could get to Peterborough via Ely and March, while the line westward to St Ives and Huntingdon were opened. In 1851 trains reached Newmarket and Bury St Edmunds. During the summer of 1862 the Bedford and Cambridge railway opened. In 1865 the Cambridge to Sudbury was complete.

Cambridge Station began with one long platform, but as more lines were opened and traffic increased more platforms were added into the station. It was accorded Grade II listed status in 1962. The main public rooms were given decorative

cornices and friezes and the incorporation in each arch spandrel of a badge representing one of the Cambridge colleges or a prominent individual. On the from elevation were the arms of St Catherine's and King's Colleges, Trinity Hall, Pembroke College, Peterhouse, the Town of Cambridge, 7th Duke of Leeds, 4th Earl of Hardwicke, 3rd Duke of Northumberland, Lord Lyndhurst, The University of Cambridge, Clare, Gonville and Caius, Corpus Christi, Queens' and Jesus Colleges. On the North facing return of this elevation are the arms of Magdalene and Christ's Colleges, while on the South facing return the only surviving crest is that of Sidney Sussex College.

- 2. C19 Church of St Paul, Hills road, (1841) by Ambrose Poynter, very precise red brickwork with diapers of vitrified headers. Red brick was an unusual material at that time. Straight headed perpendicular windows except for the arched east window. Aisled chancel by Elborne 1864, transepts by Moore, 1893. Interior with tall thin octagonal piers without capitals, and four -centred arches. Small clerestory.
- 3. Parish Church of St. Pauls stands on the east side of Hills Road. The walls are of red brick with blue brick diapering and dressings of limestone; the roofs are slate-covered. The church was built, probably on an aisled-hall plan of five bays with only a shallow sanctuary, in 1841 to the designs of Ambrose Poynter and licensed the following year. The form of the building was condemned in a critique in the Ecclesiologist (I, g, 67). The aisled Chancel was added in 1864 and the North Vestry built at the same time incorporating parts of an earlier vestry; designs by H. G. Elborne for a scheme closely similar to the existing additions are preserved in the church. In 1893 the galleries over the north and south aisles were removed and North and South Transepts to the designs of Temple Moore added. In 1931 the fittings were rearranged. The building is in the Tudor style, and the exercise of severe economy is evident in the design of the interior. The revived early 17th-century style for the fittings of 1841 is of interest. Architectural Description-The Chancel (32.5 by 25.25 ft.) is of 1864. The stone chancel-arch is probably all of the same date, for the destroyed actuary was lit by a further clearstorey window in continuation of each of the existing ranges, as appears on the S. in J. B. Harraden's view of the exterior of 1842 (W. Day and L. Haghe litho.). The Nave (61.25 by 25.25 ft.) has arcades of five bays in the north and south walls with moulded four-centred arches springing from octagonal piers and semi-octagonal responds without caps; the mouldings are run in plaster and stop at the springings. The embattled clearstorey has ten windows on each side, each window being of two four-centred lights in a square head. The North and South Aisles (11.25 ft. wide) have embattled parapets. In each aisle, west of the late 19th century transepts, which occupy the two eastern bays, are three windows of three four-centred and transomed lights in a square head; the western-most lights on both sides open into small storeroom behind partitions. The West Tower (16 ft by 153 ft) is in three stages, with diagonal buttresses, an embattled parapet and corner-turrets. The tower-arch is moulded in plaster and two-centred. In the north and south walls are doorway's with moulded jambs, four-centred openings and cusped spandrels in square heads. The west window is of three cinquefoiled and transomed lights in a four-centred head. On each face of the second stage is a round clock-face of slate in a square stone frame, one with the date 1841 cut in the spandrels. In each wall of the third stage is a three-light window with a four-centred head. The panelled roof of the nave is divided into ten bays by plain tie-beams supported on shaped brackets and each bay is divided into four main and eight subsidiary panels by plain longitudinal beams. The lean-to roofs of the aisles have trusses with plain tie-beams and a turned post in the centre of each.

A single bell by Mears, London, 1843.

Clock: in tower, inserted in 1843.

Font: of limestone, hexagonal, straight-sided bowl with moulded top and lower edge and carved scrollwork in each face, square tapering stem with panelled sides and moulded base, on low square pedestal, probably 1841, in early 17th-century style.

Gallery: across west end of nave, supported on a timber arcade of three bays with turned columns on tall plinth and four-centred arches with panelled spandrels and turned pendants at the apices, 1841, in early 17th-century style. Panelling: In chancel, across eastern wall and with short returns on north and south walls, a length of moulded panelling above a plain plank dado divided into bays by pilaster strips carved with jewelled arabesques, with a frieze containing shaped brackets, arabesque and jewel ornament, and a crowning dentil-cornice, 1841(?), reset and with modern painting and gilding, all in early 17th-mtury style; this may belong to the alterations of 1893.

Plate: includes a set of a cup, stand-paten and flagon, presented by members of the University in 1842, with the dateletter for 1841, the cup with rounded bowl, octagonal stem with knop and flared foot, the paten with moulded rim, the flagon with scrolled handle and shaped lid surmounted by a cross.

- 1. Originated as a chapel of Barnwell Priory. It is a simple early C13 building of nave and chancel under one roof. In the S side of the chancel one C14 window with an embattled transom. - 3. The church of St Andrew the Less stands on the N. side of the Newmarket Road. The walls are of clunch rubble, extensively refaced with rough freestone ashlar, much of it reused material; the dressings are of Barnack and other freestone and the roofs are covered with tiles. The church consisting of Chancel and Nave was built early in the 13th century by the adjacent Barnwell Priory and, until the dissolution, was served by one of the canons. After being closed in 1854-6 under the supervision of the Cambridge Architectural Society when the upper part of the north wall seems to have been rebuilt and the lower part refaced; it was reopened in the latter year. The Vestry and Organ Chamber were built in the later 19th century and the south porch in 1929 on the site of the earlier porch. A choir vestry was added on the north in 1955.

The Chancel is structurally undivided from the nave. In the east wall there are three 13th century lancet windows, with two centred rear arches of two moulded orders. The string course below the sills is continuous round the church. In the north wall which sets back above the string are two modern lancet windows and a modern doorway. In the south wall are two window; the eastern is a restored 13th century lancet window, the western is of the late 14th century.

The Nave has in the north wall three lancet-windows and further east an opening to the organ and a staircase all of the later 19th century. In the south wall are three completely restored lancet windows. The south doorway is largely original. In the west wall are two restored lancet-windows and in the gable are two modern openings for bells.

Fittings-Bellls: two, inaccessible, with Latin inscriptions, one said to be by Taylor of St. Neots c.1800 the other probably post 1850.

Coffin Lid: In chancel- tapering slab with moulded edge and ornamental raised cross, 13th century.

Font: Of limestone, plain octagonal bowl and stem with moulded base 13th century.

Painting: In nave, high on W. wall, large sacred monogram in a circle, red, date unknown.

Piscina: In S. wall of chancel, rectangular recess with two drains, C13, wooden frame.

4. This is an aisleless Early English building, said to owe its origin to the desire of the monks to find separate accommodation for the parish outside their own church. In the churchy ard is a long laudatory inscription to the memory of Jacob Butler (d 1765), "a grand old Briton", now largely illegible. For further details see photocopy of this entry in

Entering the Victorian gardens from the Trumpington gates the main axial walk, lined with a rare collection of pines and cedars, leads E. to a fountain of stone and steel, completed in 1969 to a design by David Mellor of Sheffield. A perimeter walk runs around the garden, interrupted only along part of the northern boundary where the research area is located. The axial path leads through collections of chestnuts and maples to a woodland and bog garden created in 1882.the woodland includes an ornamental bamboo collection established in 1883, the first such outdoor collection in the country. The walk continues part a number of glasshouses, originally built in the 1880s. To the E. of the glasshouse range is the Terrace Garden planted with shrubs and dwarf conifers built in the 1860s as a Rock Garden and renamed in the 1950s when the new Rock Garden was constructed. The Old Pinetum and group of mature oak trees represents the original planting along what was the eastern boundary of the garden, and which today (1999) mark the division between the Victorian garden and the 20th century garden.

Turning N. back towards Trumpinton Gates paths enclose the Systematic beds. It houses the eighty four families of the

hardy herbaceous plants which could be grown in Cambridge. Along the western boundary opposite the Systematic Beds, is a collection of lime species. To the E. of Middle Walk is the 20th century garden, developed continuously from the 1950s onward. Turning E. again the circuit passes a newly established maze planted with an ornamental grass. The walk runs through the Rose Garden to the E. boundary where the herbaceous island beds and some of the nine national collections are located. Turning back towards the W. the path passes the Scented Garden, Chronological Bed and Winter Garden. Continuing W. along the main walk, the path passes the Genetics Garden, the Dry Garden and the Ecological Areas.

2. The original site of the 1762 Botanic Garden was along Downing Street at the junction of Free School Lane. The present Garden along Trumpington Road is laid out on 16 hectares obtained in 1831, and was opened in 1846. From its beginning the Botanic Garden has provided facilities for research, education and amenity.

The original plan of the Garden is based on an idea of the first curator, A. Murray. The lay out consists of a serpentine perimeter walk by Professor John Stevens Henslow, either side of a main walk, which leads from the entrance by Hobson's Conduit on Trumpington Road to a circular fountain, designed by David Mellor in the mid 1970s. The systematic beds are arranged to De Candole's classification and are divided by low hedges. Henslow sited the first rock garden and the glasshouse range around 1830, along the north boundary. The original bog and water garden was redesigned in 1882; and a year later the first ornamental bamboo collection in the country was planted. Cory Lodge, the Director's house was designed in 1924 by M. H. Baillie Scott.

After the Second World War the eastern half of the Garden, formerly allotments, was developed for research purposes. A winter garden established in the 1950s has been superseded by a larger layout in 1976. The Pinetum of the 1960s replaced earlier planting and the informal lake and water gardens were improved and extended at the same time. The range of cedar glasshouses of 1888-91 were rebuilt to the same design in 1934. Recently one section has been re-designed and was replanted in 1988-89 to demonstrate the range of plants, ferns, cycads and orchids from America, Australia, Africa and Asia.

During the 1950s, an Ecological Area was established with a mound of outcrops of carboniferous limestone for native species that grow on limestone hills in western, central and northern Britain. Nearby are beds of wetland plants that can be seen at the nature reserve of Wicken Fen. There is also a demonstration of the natural variation in a single native British species, the Juniper, planted from 1970 onwards.

Other areas include native species to be found on the Breckland; rare species protected by law; plants with different pollination mechanisms, and variations within wild species.

The Garden holds National Collections of tulips, alchemillas, bergenias, ribes, saxif rages, species geraniums and fritillarias, butcher's broom, and woody honey suckles. A scented garden was built in 1960; and in the 1990s a grass maze and a garden, which will receive only rainwater have been planted. Today the Botanic Garden grows 8,600 plant species. The garden can be enjoyed for both its 19th century or 20th century planting.

4. The first Botanic Garden in Cambridge, a formal physic garden, was established in 1762 on the land where the lecture rooms and laboratories of the New Museums Site now stand. The current garden was the brainchild of Professor John Stevens Henslow, the teacher who first inspired Darwin to study natural history. It opened to the public in 1846. Henslow was particularly interested in trees, and he established his garden on a large site where there was space for a considerable collection from all over the world-including the oldest giant redwoods in Britain. Much of the planting in the garden is arranged on scientific principles, with many of the plants, including trees, grouped together into biological families, so that their relationships and differences can be studied.

It is orientated North-South and comprises a shallow sanctuary and nave under one roof, east and west aisles and a south vestry. The nave is of six uninterrupted arcaded bays with a clearstorey; the aisles stop some 6ft short of the south end wall of the sanctuary. The form of the building is reminiscent of King's College Chapel. A north porch was added in the second half of the 19th century. Minor repairs and alterations to the interior were made in 1946.

The sanctuary and nave are structurally undivided. The south and north ends have stepped gables and the east and west walls have embattled parapets. At the south end are diagonal buttresses. The north end has tall octagonal turrets at the angles divided by stone strings into stages. In the east and west walls are arcades of six bays with plain octagonal piers and moulded four-centred arches. The east and west side aisles are uniform and divided into six bays by buttresses of brick and stone in two weathered stages. In each bay is a transomed window of two lights with four centred openings in a square head with a segmental rear arch. In the south and north are small single light windows above doorways with four-centred heads. The panelled roof of the nave is contemporary with the building

Mr. Foreman's considerable leadership came to the fore again in the building of a new chapel that was to be Eden's home for the next 50 years. The second pastor, William Allen, was also a high Calvinist and was firmly against theological education (his theological stance was underlined by the presence of the conservative Baptist William Gadsby at his ordination service). In response to his forceful style of preaching the congregation swelled and galleries were built to increase the seating capacity.. (One) of the most famous pastors of Eden's history, John Bunyan McCure. He had previously travelled extensively in Australia, preaching to the increasing numbers of gold-diggers, and planting churches. After his arrival the congregation grew and it became clear that a new chapel was needed, which was subsequently built on the site of the old building during 1874. The periodical The Earthen Vessel recorded the laying of the foundation stone of the new building: Wednesday, June 10, 1874, was a most auspicious day for the Eden Chapel friends in Cambridge. We reached the ground on which John Foreman's old Eden did stand, and on which John Buny an McCure's will soon be raised...' The new chapel, built by Mr. Thoday who attended the church, had a seating capacity of about 750. The Cambridge Express praised the "indefatigable persev erance which marks the character of Mr. McCure", and described the new chapel as "one of the most suitable, convenient, and appropriate edifices in Cambridge". The chapel of 1874 remained Eden's home until the redevelopment of the local area in 1982. This resulted in the building of the present chapel (opened in December 1982), and the old chapel's being incorporated into a new shopping centre (See website for further history).

- 2. In 1858, a mortuary chapel was erected at the Mill Road Cemetery. It was subsequently deemed unsafe and finally demolished in 1954.
- 3. Mill Road Cemetery is a 3.5 hectare cemetery established in 1848 in response to the creation of a non-conformist burial ground at Histon Road Cambridge in 1843. The site is on level ground entirely enclosed by a low brick wall. Features include a knapped flint and stone Gothic-style lodge, several listed monuments and serpentine perimeter walks. The Parish Burial Ground Committee was established in 1844, and the land was bought in 1847 for the use of 13 parishes. Once the land had been drained, boundary walls, gravel drives, railings, gates, and a lodge were laid out and the grounds were consecrated at the official opening by the Bishop of Ely on 7 November 1848. The chapel was designed by George Gilbert Scott, and was opened in 1858.

There are eight graves in the Mill Road cemetery which have been assigned Grade II listed status, as they are tombs of special architectural or historic interest.

The planting around the serpentine paths and perimeter of the site has a naturalistic feel, with mature trees including weeping beech, weeping ash, sy camore, and varieties of pines informally arranged. The drive is lined with pollarded limes and clipped evergreens, and the site is entirely enclosed by a low brick wall.

In 1996 Cambridge City Council Landscape Design Group produced a report regarding the future of the cemetery, as it had become run down. The proposals from this report are still awaited.

Following the formation of the Star Brewery Company Ltd in 1892-3, several other local breweries were taken over and public houses acquired, including the Victoria Brewery in Albert Street and the Priory Brewery in Newmarket Road. The Star Brewery Company remained independent until 1934, when it was taken over by Tollemache Breweries of Ipswich. Brewing ceased in 1972 and the premised were closed in 1981, and have almost been totally demolished by 1982. The garden boundary wall running to the north-east is probably part of the precinct wall of the priory. In 1922 Arthur Askam, son of a Cambridge landlord, kept the garden in a good condition, and held country dancing for children on the lawns. The drive, originally from Newmarket Road, has been sold and the entrance is now via Abbey Road.

Towards the end of his life Askam let the grass grow tall and kept goats to maintain the lawns. In the garden are numerous wrought stones, presumably from the Priory. They include parts of 12th-century mouldings, incorporated in two rustic arches, and a 13th-century stone base used as a capital. Elsewhere various moulded dressings are built into the wall and flanking the entrance gateway are two medieval carved heads.

Today there are drifts of spring bulbs beneath the trees, which frame views of the church of St. Andrew the Less and the Cellarer's Chequer which is all that remains of the priory.

The new Guardians at first retained only six of the parochial Workhouses, St. Andrew the Less, St. Mary the Less and Holy Sepulchre, Holy Trinity, St. Andrew the Great, All Saints and St. Edward, and appointed a Committee to arrange for a Central Union Workhouse to take two hundred and fifty inmates. The building was designed by John Smith and occupied in 1838; the site had cost £48o. Some alterations and extensions were made almost immediately. The original lay-out included four courts with porter's lodge, tramps' cells, bedrooms and offices, master's and matron's rooms, day-rooms, dormitories, baths, workshops, chapel and mortuary.

The administrative block survives, amongst later buildings and is a long narrow building. The S.W. front is of eight bays; excluding the S.E. bay, the other bays are symmetrically arranged with a central doorway and the end bays paired under pedimented gables. At first floor level, there is a continuous plat-band. The ground floor windows are round-headed, the upper windows segmental-headed and all contain double-hung sashes. The doorway has an architrave and a cornice supported on console-brackets. The pedimented gables have full cornices of which the lower members are continued across the building as a widely projecting eaves cornice; each tympanum contains a small stucco panel with the date 1838. The interior of the building has been completely modernised.

Description

- 1. Between 6th and 13th November 2012 an archaeological excavation at St Matthew's Primary School, Norfolk Street, Cambridge was cairred out after the discovery of human remains during the construction of new school buildings. There had been a previous evaluation in the south of the site in 2008 that revealed coprolite pits (MCB18137). A trench measuring 12m by 6m was opened in the north-west part of the development area. Seven complete burials were uncovered in the excavation area with a further four surviving only in part. The excavated graves contained the remains of thirteen individuals including one adult, one neonate, two infants and nine children aged 6 years or younger. Two of the graves contained two burials which had probably occurred simultaneously. The pathology of the skeletal remains is indicative of the children having poor diet and perhaps having died during a bout of disease or epidemic. The cemetery was associated with a Baptist Chapel, seen on historic maps of the area and since demolished. The Providence Calvinistic Baptist Chapel was in use for four years between 1833 and 1837 before it was sold to pay off debts. Many of the graves contained copper alloy pins, most likely used to secure shrouds around the corpses, and had the remains of coff in fittings such as wood stains and iron nails. A headstone inscribed with the name 'Harriet Halls' and that of her husband 'James Henry Halls' was also found.
- 2. An evaluation of the site in 2008 (MCB18137) revealed a series of large, parallel straight-edged features, providing clear evidence for large-scale quarrying, which was probably associated with coprolite extraction in the 19th century. Two later features containing pottery dated to 1820-1860 were also recorded, possibly refuse pits associated with settlement along East Road. The site of the quarrying appears to have been deliberately levelled, and built up in preparation for the building of St. Matthew's Primary School.

MATERIALS: Constructed of red brick with yellow gault brick to the sides and stone dressings. The roof is slate covered.

PLAN: The building is rectangular in plan.

EXTERIOR: The main elevation is three storeys aver a basement with an attic storey. The roof is pitched with coped, parapet gables, and a hipped front section. It has a moulded, stone eaves cornice over the main street front and four evenly spaced dormers lighting the attic storey. Seven window bays wide, the central three bays break forward under a round pediment. The break forward like the main corners, has rusticated stone quoins. Within the pediment there is a circular light in a decorative stone surround, on each side of which is the date 1903, the numerals divided between two lozenge-shaped inset stones. The main elevation is surmounted by a substantial, octagonal lantern. The lantern is wooden with round arched openings, containing a balustrade, and Lead-faced beneath. At first-floor level the window openings have segmental heads, under a stone drip mould, and stone sills fronted by decorative iron balcony railings. Above, the window openings are square headed with gauged bricks and prominent stone keystones. The window frames, apparently late C20 like-for-like replacements, are tall casements. The down pipes have rainwater heads dated 1903 which are fed through openings in the eaves cornice. Attached to the facade at first floor level are two iron brackets for lamp hanging, although the lamps are now lost. At ground floor level the show windows in a grey granite surround, are modern while maintaining the bay divisions of the upper level. The modern entranceway is placed centrally. The rear elevation is of late C20 in date, with a modern stair tower attached to the right, and is of little interest.

INTERIOR: The main features of interest internally are the main staircase and the light welt, although some simple cornices survive. The light well floor openings are round-ended rectangles and the well is capped by a pitched roof light with hips. The floor is supported by square columns with moulded heads at the corners of the light well. The main stair has suffered some slight alteration, mainly as the result of the insertion of a modest lift. It is a dog leg stair with turned balusters and square newels with ball finials. The bases of the upper newels are finished with finials. On the main floors the staircase baluster rails have semi-circular recesses. Modern glazed partitions and offices on the two upper floors are of little historic interest, as is a lift shaft inserted into the stair well in the late C20.

HISTORY

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The firm of Laurie and McConnal, purveyors of general ironmongery, stationery and fancy goods, took over this site around 1891. The premises were extended into adjacent shops in c1901, c1910, and again in c1915, by which time they occupied 121-129 Fitzroy Street, as the plots were at that time numbered. One of these buildings is likely to have been a separate building to the

This is shown on the 1927 Ordnance Survey Map, During this expansion the original store was demolished and the present building, designed by R. Frank Atkinson, was erected in 1903. Atkinson was well known for the major London store of Warling and Gillow, on Oxford Street, one of the grandest Edwardian department stores. In c1925 Laurie and McConnal erected a new two storey block on the west side of the 1903 building. Laurie and McConnal occupied the site until the 1980s. At this time th6 streetscape was altered when the Crafton Centre, a large shopping mall, was erected. Many of the historic buildings lining Fitzroy Street have been swept away to be replaced by the present modern units. Although it is suggested that the building suffered a fire, 17 Fitzroy Street survived the changes, unlike the other Laurie and McConnal premises which were lost. The line of Fitzroy Lane, on the north side of the site, was altered slightly to respect a new car park and at around this time the rear of the store was rebuilt, but this does not appear from map evidence to have reduced the footprint of the store. A photograph in the Cambridgeshire Collection shows that office partitions at the rear of the store have been lost, probably at this time, as has an additional stair and balustrade, which probably led from the centre of the ground-floor to the basement. A modern stair tower was added at the northwest corner. The building was latterly occupied by Habitat who, it is believed, created the present ground-floor shop front. SOURCES Morrison, K.
