OF THE OVERSEERS

OF ST. MARY'S PARISH

IN ELY.

1606 - 1808.

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The documents which are to be found in the chest in most of our parish churches provide invaluable material for the study of Local History. Local Government centred on the Parish Church; on the Churchwardens, on the Surveyors of Roads and on the Overseers of the Poor. If the historian is fortunate he will be able to see at first hand from churchwardens' accounts the working of the parish affairs; from the records of the Overseers of the Poor the very considerable amount of organization which was covered by the Poor Laws of the Stuart period. But what he is almost certain to find is the vast number of documents which resulted from the Act of Settlement passed by the Cavalier Parliament of Charles II.

Trevelyan in his "English Social History" writes:-

By this Act every parish in which a man tried to settle could send him back to the parish of which he was native, for fear that if he stayed in his new abode he might at some future date become chargeable on the rates. Nine-tenths of the people of England, all in fact who did not belong to a small class of landowners, were liable to be expelled from any parish save their own, with every circumstance of arrest and ignominy, however good their character and even if they had secured remunerative work. The panic fear of some parish authorities lest newcomers should some day fall on the rates, caused them to exercise this unjust power in quite unnecessary cases. The Act placed a check upon the fluidity of labour and was as much an outrage as the press-gang itself on the boasted freedom of Englishmen. Yet it was seldom denounced, until many years later Adam Smith dealt with it in scathing terms. It is hard to ascertain the exact degree to which it operated, and Adam Smith appears to have exaggerated the harm done and the number of cases in which cruel wrong was inflicted; but at best it was a great evil.

As will be seen from the documents here transcribed the bulk of the papers which exist at St. Mary's are concerned

with the question of settlement. At the beginning of each section I have included a specimen of the documents chosen at random and these samples may be taken as representative of those which are listed in date order in the pages which immediately follow. The Examinations, however, are each of them distinct and individual personal records and for this reason I have thought it worth while to transcribe them in full.

The documents which I have recorded are to be found in the ancient parish chest which stands in the south-east corner of the nave of St. Mary's church. For permission to browse among these papers, to sort and arrange them, I am indebted to the Vicar of Ely, the Revd. Canon J.M.E. Bagley, to whom my grateful thanks are due.

APPRENTICE INDENTURES.

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This Indenture made the Thirtieth day of Aprill in the Eighth yeare of the Reigne of or Soveraigne Lord Charles by the grace of god of England, Scotland, ffrance & Ireland King, defender of the faith etc. Witnesseth that Thomas Rayner and John Carter of Ely wthin the Isle of Ely in the County of Cambr, Yeomen, Church Wardens of St. Maries parish in Ely afore said together with Robert Anger, William Gotobed Junr. Robert ffowler and William Smith of Ely afore said overseers for the poore of the said parish for the time being have according to the statute in that behalfe made and provided put forth and bound one Richard Kisbey (sonne of Andrewe Kisbey late of Ely deceased) a poore childe an apprentise unto William Kisbey of Ely aforesaid, husbandman: and after the manner of an apprentice wth him to dwell from the day of the date hereof untill hee shall accomplish & come to the full age of one & twenty yeares, during all which said terme the said Richard apprentise unto the afre said William as his Master well & faithfully shall serve, his secrets shall keepe, his commandementes lawfull & honest every where and at all times shall doe, ffornication wthin the house of his said master nor wthout hee shall not committ, hurt to his said master hee shall not doe nor consent to be done but to his power & knowledge he shall let & wthstand the same and thereof in due time his said Master advertise & fore warne. Taverns & other victualling houses of Custome hee shall not haunt or frequent except it bee about his said masters businesse & affaires there to bee done. At the Dice, Cardes or any other unlawfull games hee shall not playe, the goods of his said master he shall not inordinately waste nor them to any man lend wthout his said masters speciall lycence & approbation. Matrimonie wth any woman wthin the said terme hee shall not contract nor espouse, nor from his service neither by day nor by night shall absent or wthdrawe himselfe but as a true and faithfull servant ought hee shall behave himselfe towardes his said master as well in wordes as in deedes. And the said William Kisbey unto the said Richard his apprentise in the Arte & Skill of Husbandry wch hee now useth after the best manner

that hee can or may shall teach & informe or cause to bee taught and informed as much as thereunto belongeth or in any wise appertaineth and in due manner and medure to Chastise him, ffynding to the said servant meate, drinke, lodging, lynnen, woollen hose, shoes and all other thinges necessary and expedient for an Apprentise of his Ranke & quallitie according to the Custome of the Country wherein hee liveth. the End & Expieracon of his Apprentishippe shall give or cause to be given unto his said Apprentise dubble apparrell (vizl) one suite for the holy dayes & another for the working dayes decent and meet for his body, and in the meane while shall discharge the said parish of & from all manner of Charges, Expences & incumbrances whatsoever for & concerning the maintainance & bringing up of the said Richard Kisbey his said Apprentise till he shall come to one & twenty yeares of Age. In witnesse whereof the parties above named unto these present Indentures have set their handes & seales interchangably the day and yeare first above written.

Know all men by these presents That wee Henry Coverley of Ely wthin the Isle of Ely & Countie of Cambridge, husbandman, & Robert Ley of Wichford wthin the Isle & Countie afresaid, husbandman, doe stand firmely holden & bounde unto Michael Aungier, Gentleman, & Thomas Gotobed the Elder of Ely aforesaid, Churchwardens for St. Maries parish in Ely in Twenty pounds of good & lawfull money of England To be paid unto the said Michael Aungier & Thomas Gotobed or to Successors Churchwardens of Maries parish in Ely aforesaid for the time being to the use & behoofe of the said parish and the whole Towne of Ely aforesaid. To the wch payment well & faithfully to be made wee bynde us & either of us & or & either of or heires, executors & administrators & every of them joyntly & severally for & in the wholl payment aforesaid firmely by these presentes. Sealed wth or seales & dated the thirteenth day of January in the yeare of or Lord one Thousand Six hundred ffiftie & two.

The condicon of this obligacon is such That whereas the above bound Henry Coverley hath taken one Katherine ffoster the daughter of one John ffoster late of Wichford aforesaid, husbandman deceased, to mayntaine, bring up & keepe wth meate, drinke, apparrell & all things necessary untill shee ye said Katherine shall come to her full age of one and Twenty yeares If therefore the said Henry Coverley, his heires, executors or administrators or any of them doe at his or their owne proper costs & charges from time to time & at all times bring up, mayntains, susteyne & keepe the said Katherine ffoster wth sufficient meate, drinke, apparrell, lodging. washing & all manner of things necessary and shall discharge or save hamelesse the Towne of Ely aforesaid of her the said Katherine untill shee shall come to her full age of one & twenty yeares, So as the said Katherine be no waies chargeable to any of ye Inhabitants of ye said Towne of Ely at any time during the said terme That then this obligacon shalbe void & of none effect, otherwise to remain & stande in full force & vertue.

The Examination of Jno.Wilkin, Labourer, of Ely, taken upon Oath this twenty ninth day of January 1731 before us Edward Partheriche Esqr, George Mayfield Esqr. & Jno.

King Esqr, three of his Majestys Justices of ye Peace for ye sd Isle.

This Examinant upon his Oath says yt he is now about sixty five years of age, yt he was born in ye Parish of Ely St. Marys in ye Isle of Ely, yt he was never bound apprentice & yt ye last whole years Service yt he performed was in ye Parish of Ely St. Marys wth Wm. Layton, Yeoman, & since that he sold an estate in ye Parish of Ely St. Marys aforesd & came to live in another estate of his own in ye Parish of Ely Trinity aforesd & has done never any act since that he knows off to gain a settlement elsewhere.

Isle of Ely to Wit.

The Examination of ffrancis Ayton, Shoemaker, taken upon oath the 31th day of October 1744 before us two of his Majestys Justices of the peace for the said Isle and one of us of the Quorum.

Who saith that he is about 25 years of Age, was born in the parish of Saint Nicholas in the City of Durham and about thirteen years of Age was bound Apprentice by Indenture to one Robert Smith of the parish of Saint Oswald in the sd city of Durham, Shoemaker, for seven years; that he served his sd Master about five years and a quarter of the said term of seven years and his sd Master then dying this Examint went to one Thomas Ware of the sd City, Shoemaker, (but of what parish this Examint knows not) and staid with the sd Ware about nine weeks and at the general Quarter Sessions off the peace held next after the decease of this Examints Master for the sd City he this Examint was discharged at the sd Sessions from the Service of the Widow of his sd Master and was not turn'd over to any other person, since which time this Examint has been travelling about the Country for work and never rented ten pounds a year, paid any poor Rates, executed any annual office or done any other Act (to his knowledge) to gain a settlement elsewhere. And this Examint further maketh oath that about seven Months since he this Examint was marry'd to Elizabeth Moor of the parish of Saint Mary in Ely in the said Isle, Widow, at the parish Church of Saint Mary aforesd.

Isle of Ely to Wit.

The Examination of John Martin, Laborer, taken upon oath before us two of his Majestys Justices of the peace for the sd Isle (one of us of the Quorum) the 31th day of October 1744.

Who saith that he is about 35 years old, was born at Hawkston in the County of Cambridge, that at Michmas 1739 this Examint let himself to Rivers Tayler of Histon in the sd County, ffarmer, for one whole year but at what wages this Examint cannot remember; that he performed his whole years service and recd his whole wages, that he continued with his sd Master for the three next following years, perform'd the sd last three years Service and recd the sd several last three years Wages from his sd Master, the last two years Wages being six pounds each year; that he never rented ten pounds a year, paid any poor Rates, executed any annual Office, or done any other Act (to his knowledge) to gain a Settlemt elsewhere. And further maketh Oath that about 14 Months since he marryed Elizabeth Harrington, Widow, at the Town of Cambridge.

The Examination of John Norman, Bricklayer, taken upon Oath before us two of his Majestys Justices of the peace for the sd Isle and one of us of the Quorum this 31th day of October 1744.

Who saith that he is about 24 years old, was born at Isleham in the County of Cambridge, was at about 12 years of Age bound Apprentice by Indenture to one Richard Norman of Great Swaffham in the sd County, Bricklayer, for 7 years; that he served about two years and a half of the sd term with his sd Master, who then dying he worked by the week with one Thomas Parrot of Isleham aforesd, Bricklayer, when the sd Parrot had any work to do in the Bricklayers way; that he never rented ten pounds a year, paid any poor Rates, exercised any annual Office or done any other Act (to his knowledge) to gain a settlement elsewhere.

Who saith that he is about 27 years of Age, was born at Uttoxeter in the county of Stafford; at about 14 years old was bound Apprentice by Indenture to one Richard Chatterton, of the parish of Saint Mary in the City of Litchfield, Carpender, for seven years; that he served his said Master the sd term of seven years and since travelled the Country for work; that he never rented ten pounds a year, paid any poor Rates, executed any annual Office or done any other Act (to his knowledge) to gain a Settlement elsewhere and that about 2 years and a half since he was marryed to Ann Ingram, Spinster, at the parish Church of Trinity in Ely.

Thurlow.

This man, his wife and family are now become chargeable to the Parish of St. Mary in Ely.

You will be pleased to Observe that Edward Thurlow the pauper's last Service was with Mr. Nunn of Over. That he served him from a week before Christmas 1779 untill Michaelmas 1780 - and received his Wages. That he then let himself again for one Year but left his said Master's Service on the Sunday before the plow Monday following without receiving any Wages.

Therefore as this Man served part of his Year with Mr. Nunn of Over and received his Wages for that part of the year - Let himself again to his Master Nunn and stayed with him in the same Service under different hirings for a Space of time, which more than compleated the Year, and would have received his Wages had he kept in his Master Nunn's Service And not deserted it through his own imprudent Conduct - To what parish do he and his family belong.

E. Thurlow's Settlement was at St. Mary's before he was hired by Mr. Nunn at Over. There he served a very little more than a year, under two Contracts, one whereof was for a year; & as it is now clear that such a Service gains a Settlement it is not material how much the Service exceeds a year. He has received no Wages under the 2d Hiring, but that was his own Fault: the Service gains the Settlement & he was in his Master's Service untill the Day he ran away. I am therefore of Opinion that his Settlement is at Over.

KNOW ALL MEN by these Presents that I Granado Pigott of Ely in the Isle of Ely & County of Cambridge, Gentleman, am held and firmly bound unto Paul Gotobed and Thomas Day, Churchwardens, and William Layton and Robert Few, Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Saint Mary in Ely in the said Isle of Ely and County of Cambridge aforesaid in the Sum of Eighty Pounds of good and lawful Money of Great Britain to be paid to the said Churchwardens and Overseers or to their certain Attorney, their Executors, Administrators or Assigns, for which Payment well & faithfully to be made I Bind myself, my Heirs, Executors and Administrators and Every one of us for & in the whole firmly by these Presents, Sealed with my Seal, Dated this Thirtieth Day of December in the first year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third by the Grace of God of Great Britain, France and Ireland King, Defender of the Faith and so forth and in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty.

THE CONDITION of this Obligation is such that WHEREAS Mary Ellis of the Parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid, Singlewoman, was in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Seven Hundred Fifty and Nine Delivered of a Female Bastard Child, and also was lately Delivered of another Female Bastard Child in the said Parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid, both which said Children are likely to be Chargeable to the said Parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid, and of both which said Children the abovesaid Granado Pigott is the reputed Father, IF THEREFORE the said Granado Pigott, his Heirs, Executors and Administrators or any of them shall and do from time to time and at all times hereafter fully and clearly Acquit, Exonerate and Discharge or otherwise well and sufficiently save, keep harmless and indemnified as well the abovenamed Church-Wardens and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Saint Mary in Elly aforesaid and their Successors for the time being Church-Wardens and Overseers

of the Poor of the said Parish of Saint Mary in Ely of the as all & singular other the Parishioners aforesaid, as all & singular other the Parishioners aforestants of the said Parish of Saint Mary in and aforesaid as now are or hereafter shall be for the time being of and from all and all manner of Costs, Charges, Damages and Expences whatsoemer, which shall or may at any time or times hereafter arise, happen, come, grow or be imposed upon them, either or any of them for or be reason of the Education, Maintenance, Nourishment and Bringing up of the said two several Female Children or Either of them and of and from all Actions, Suits, Troubles & other Charges and Demands whatsoever touching or concerning the said Female Children or Either of them, Then this present Obligation to be void, or else to be and remain in full Force, Power and Virtue.

The order of us Aungier Peacocke and Henry Morley Esquires two of his Majesties Justices of the peace for the said Isle (one being of the Quorum) and both inhabiting near the parish of Saint Mary in Ely in the said Isle made this first day of March in the year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and fifty for the Relief of the said parish and for the keeping of a Male Bastard Child begotten of the Body of Ann Patrick, Widow, and born in the said parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid on the eleventh day of January last past and chargeable to the said parish.

Whereas it appeareth unto us upon the oath of the said Ann Patrick taken in writing before us on the first day of March instant that Henry Hills of the parish of Trinity in Ely aforesaid, Bricklayer, had carnal Knowledge of the Body of the said Ann Patrick and is the ffather of the said Male Bastard Child We do therefore order and adjudge the said Henry Hills to be the only ffather of the said Male Bastard Child born in the said parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid and chargeable to the said last menconed parish. And we do further order him the said Henry Hills to pay weekly and on the Saturday in every week successively the sum of One shilling and sixpence of lawful money of Great Britain unto the Overseers of the poor of the said parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid for the time being or one of them for and towards the Maintenance of the said Male Bastard Child so long as the said Male Bastard Child shall continue chargeable to the said parish. And we do also further order the said Henry Hills to pay to the Overseers of the poor of the said parish of Saint Mary or one of them the sum of Three pounds and Five shillings of like lawful money immediately after Notice of this our Order towards the charge of the lying in and other necessary Expences of the said Ann Patrick. And we do also further order that the said Ann Patrick. And we do also la the day week-ly and ly and on the Saturday in every week successively the sum

of sixpence of like lawful money to the Overseers of the of slxpoor of the said parish of Saint Mary for the time being or one of them towards the maintenance of the said Male Bastard Child so long as the said Male Bastard Child shall continue chargeable to the said parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid except such part of the time as she shall nourish and keep the said Male Bastard Child. And lastly we do order that the said Henry Hills on Notice of this our Order do immediately put in sufficient sureties for the performing of this our Order or otherwise personally to appear at the next General Sessions of the peace to be held in and for the said Isle and also to abide such Order as the Justices of the peace for the said Isle or the more part of them at the said Sessions shall take in this behalf if they then and there shall take any and that if at the said Sessions the said Justices for the said Isle or the more part of them shall take no other Order then to abide and perform this our Order. Given under our Hands and Seals the said first day of March in the said year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and fifty.

Taylor, Overseers of the Poor of this parish in forty pounds Condiconed for their indemnifying and saving harmless the parishioners of this parish of and from all Costs which they the said parishioners or any of them should be put unto for or by reason of the Birth, Maintenance or Educacon of a child wherewith Mary Drake of this parish, Singlewoman, was then pregnant and the said Mary Drake was afterwards delivered of a male Bastard child in the sd parish which since its Birth being chargeable to the parishioners of this parish and there being now due to the parishioners of this parish the sum for the maintenance of the said Bastard child We whose names are hereunder subscribed met together at a Vestry in the parish Church of Saint Mary in Ely pursuant to a publick Notice given in the said parish Church on Sunday last immediately after Divine Service do Agree and Order that an Accon at Law be brought forthwith against the said Wm.ffrancis and Samuel Jaggard upon the said Bond and that the present Churchwardens and Overseers of the poor of the said parish of Saint Mary in Ely aforesaid do employ and retain an Attorney to bring, prosecute and carry on the Suit against them the said Wm. ffrancis and Samuel Jaggard or either of them as witness our Hand the 16th day of November 1778.

EXCOMMUNICATION.

TO our most serene Prince in Christ and Sovereign Lord GEORGE the Third by the Grace of God of Great Britain, GEORGE the Great Britain, Defender of the Faith and so forth WE MATTHIAS by Divine permission Bishop of Ely with all Buty, Submission and Obedience due to so illwith all add, with all obedience due to so ill-ustrious a Prince GREETING and wishing prosperity here and hereafter in him by whom Kings reign and Princes bear rule. WE do with all obedience signify and make known to your Royal Majesty That the Right Worshipful WHARTON PECK, Doctor of Laws, Chancellor of our Diocese of Ely and Judge of our Consistorial Court of Ely Lawfully appointed in a certain Cause or Business of Correction, by virtue of the Office of our said Chancellor and merely Spiritual, lately depending in Judgment before him and his Surrogate on the presentment of the Churchwardens of the parish of Ely St. Mary's in Ely in the Isle of Ely and County of Cambridge and or Diocese of Ely of the one part and Mary Ellis of the parish of Ely Saint Mary's aforesaid, Singlewoman, the party against whom the said Cause or Business was promoted on the other part, hath at the petition of the proctor, in that behalf authorized, pronounced the said Mary Ellis contumacious (by reason of her manifest contumacy and contempt in not appearing lawfully on a certain competent Day Time and place appointed to her the said Mary Ellis and long since past, she being first to that effect lawfully Cited so to appear, thrice publickly called, long and sufficiently expected, and in no wise lawfully appearing, but contumaciously absenting herself and so persevering so to do) and for punishment of such her Contumacy Decreed her to be Excommunicated in the Face of the Church between Divine Service and Sermon by a Presbyter lawfully authorized in that behalf, and under the Sentence of Excommunication for Forty Days and More since the publishing thereof, through an obstinate and incorrigible disposition stood, and doth now stand, in Cont. in Contempt of your Majesty's Authority and Jurisdiction Ecclesiastical, to the great prejudice of her Souls health and pernicious example of other good Christians.

And WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Laws have no further power in this behalf WE therefore in order to reform the Contumacy and Contempt of the said Mary Ellis, Humbly

supplicate and beseech that your Royal Majesty would vouchsafe to be graciously pleased, pursuant to the Laws and laudable Customs and Statutes of this Realm, to extend your Royal aid and Command to your Secular Officers to take and imprison the Body of the said Mary Ellis, that they whom the fear of God will not reclaim from their evil ways, your Majesty's observance may force and compel; and may the Almighty long preserve your Majesty to the well governing your people. IN TESTIMONY whereof We have caused the Seal of our Consistorial Court of Ely to be affixed to these presents. Dated the Thirteenth Day of March in the year of our Lord one Thousand Seven Hundred and Sixty Two and of our Translation the Ninth.

WHEREAS Thomas Burkitt of your said parish, Glover, hath before us, one of His Majesty's Deputy Lieutenants, and one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said Isle been chosen by lot to serve in the Militia of the said county, now embodied and in actual service; and hath provided Thomas James his Substitute, who hath been sworn and enrolled to serve, and hath served therein for the space of one month and upwards, and not been disapproved of by the Commanding Officer: We do hereby order you to pay to the said Thomas Burkitt the sum of Three pounds and three shillings which we adjudge to be half the current price paid for a Volunteer within the said Isle, out of a rate made for Volunteers within your said Parish, and if there be no volunteers provided by you in the said Parish, then out of a rate to be made after the manner of the poor rate, excepting out of the said rate all ballotted persons who have served for three years by themselves or substitutes of are now serving in the said militia.
